Library of Congress/National Digital Information Infrastructure and Preservation Program \$350,000

The Library of Congress has given a preliminary award of \$350,000 to the Library and Archives for the development of the Persistent Digital Archives and Library System. PeDALS is a research project to test new approaches to automate processing large quantities of electronic records and digital publications and to build a robust, trustworthy system to store the records. The project will include at least three other state libraries and archives, in anticipation of a collaborative of shared best practices and resources. The PeDALS project has also received funding through Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA).

Libraries for the Future (Equal Access) \$61,897

Arizona libraries were among the first to embrace the EqualAccess Libraries concept of transforming from institutions defined by buildings and books, to centers for lifelong learning and civic engagement. After a successful pilot three years ago, State Library and Archives collaborated with Libraries for the Future to make Arizona the second state in the nation to host the EqualAccess Libraries Institute.

Arizona Department of Veteran Affairs (Museum Project) \$32,164

The Arizona Capitol Museum received funding to upgrade and display the entire silver service and other items of historical significance from the *USS Arizona*.

ONEBOOKAZ 2006 celebrated reading in the State of Arizona by encouraging the reading and exploration of two very different books – one fiction and the other non-fiction – both of which addressed fascinating and compelling historical events and time periods in Arizona’s history. The National Endowment for the Humanities is sponsoring the National Digitization Newspaper Project. Library and Archives is applying for this grant to fund a Centennial Legacy Project: Arizona Newspapers: 1880-1912, A Centennial Legacy Project.

National Historical Publications and Records Commission \$10,000

These funds will support a regrant program to preserve and make accessible Arizona's historical records, and provide continuing archival education and training.

Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation \$9,000

Library and Archives has submitted a grant to the Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation to replace the window shades at the Carnegie Center. Forty-eight special order shades are required that meet the historical requirements in keeping with the character of the 1908 building. Some of the windows are two stories tall and in many cases, window sizes are not of standard dimensions. Lowe's employees will perform the labor involved if this grant is awarded.

Funding Denied

Institute of Museum and Library Services \$538,040

The Civic Tourism Institute was proposed under the terms of this federal grant application. The Institute was proposed to address three areas of state tourism. 1) place-based tourism; combining Arizona's natural wonders with her historical wonders; 2) shared-information tourist initiatives. Through a website and publications, bringing together a large volume of libraries, parks, private, historical and cultural sites in one place, to create a focused site that enables travelers to make informed decisions. 3) conduct educational programs that help museums, libraries, parks and other heritage sites develop responsible tourism, improve place product and enhance their voice in the larger community dialog.

NEH National Digitization Newspaper Project \$360,073

Arizona Newspapers: 1880-1910, was a grant proposal written and sent to The National Endowment for the Humanities. Arizona was, and is, seeking to become only the seventh state to participate in this ambitious project. The grant has been re-applied for as a Centennial Legacy Project (see pending funding).

Phelps-Dodge Foundation \$30,000

The Capitol Museum is seeking funding for a Welcome Center. Proposed to be located adjacent the Rotunda area on the first floor, the Welcome Center will serve as an orientation room to the Museum's permanent and rotating collections and displays. By providing school groups and other tourist groups an out-of-the way orientation room, a measure of safety will also be ensured as these groups will be taken out of the often-busy public travel ways between the Capitol and the Executive Tower.
