### ARIZONA HISTORICAL RECORDS ADVISORY BOARD

In 2008 the Arizona Historical Records Advisory Board (AHRAB) engaged in a strategic planning exercise to evaluate and refresh its 2005-2007 long range plan, *Protecting Arizona's Documentary Heritage*. It prepared this action plan for 2008-2012 to provide assistance to the historical records community: those institutions, organizations and individuals that create, keep and use records.

AHRAB is one of fifty-five organizations in the states and territories of the U. S. which act in affiliation with the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC). Statutes that define AHRAB responsibilities are located in A.R.S.41-1355. They direct the Board to serve as the central advisory board for historical records planning and for NHPRC funded projects developed and carried out in Arizona. The Board acts as a coordinating body to facilitate cooperation among historical records repositories and other information agencies within the state and to provide state-level review for proposals to the Commission's grant program. AHRAB's thirteen members are appointed by the State Coordinator and represent all facets of Arizona's historical records community.

### NATIONAL HISTORICAL PUBLICATIONS AND RECORDS COMMISSION

The NHPRC, established in 1934, is the principal federal funding agency whose only focus is the documentary heritage of the United States. It makes grants to preserve, publish and provide access to vital historical documents. NHPRC is the outreach arm of the National Archives and Records Administration.

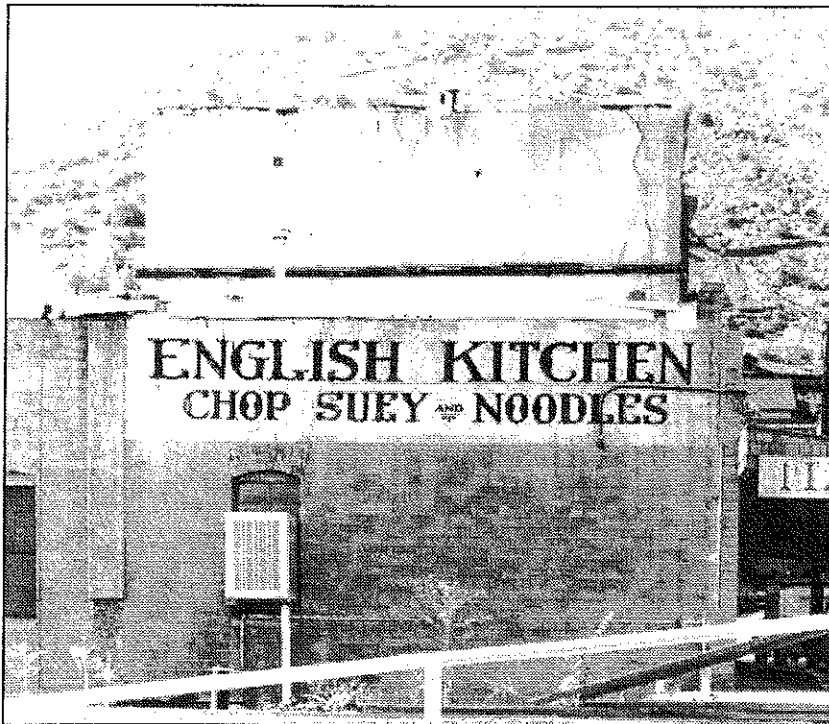
Grant funds from the NHPRC and administrative assistance from the Arizona State Library, Archives and Public Records supported this planning.

## HISTORICAL RECORDS

Historical records are unique and irreplaceable. They are among the most important resources belonging to the people of Arizona. They form a crucial part of our lives and support current and future planning and decision-making. These records offer insight into our lives, communities, economy, culture, and politics.

Preserving these materials and making them accessible is an ongoing challenge. Whether paper, photograph, recording, or electronic, each record has its own special preservation needs. Addressing these tasks is the work of historians, archivists, public officials, genealogists, and

others whose work depends on these records. It is this challenge that the Arizona Historical Records Advisory Board embraces.

- Assists under-served communities with the process, management and structure to expand and make accessible their historical materials and quality of programs
- Broadens the impact and visibility of the historical records community

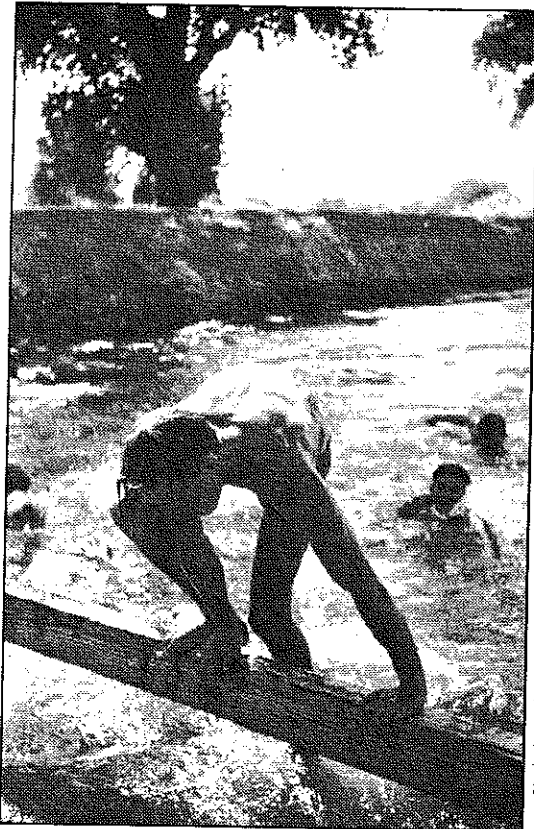
## **THE HISTORICAL RECORDS COMMUNITY**

## ***V. ROLE OF THE ARIZONA HISTORICAL RECORDS ADVISORY BOARD***

A. Design and implement a program to promote the value of:

- Preservation, access and use of historical records
- Archival and museum programs and functions
- The NHPRC grant program and AHRAB
- Collaborations among historical records custodians and organizations
- Strategic planning on a statewide scale

B. Actively communicate the value and importance of records to policy makers and resource allocators

C. Monitor and proactively communicate with state and federal officials regarding legislation affecting records and archival issues.

D. Facilitate creative uses of historical records in projects and programs that heighten public awareness and facilitate specialized research in preparation for the Arizona Centennial in 2012

E. Proactively serve as a resource and be available to advise the Centennial organizations

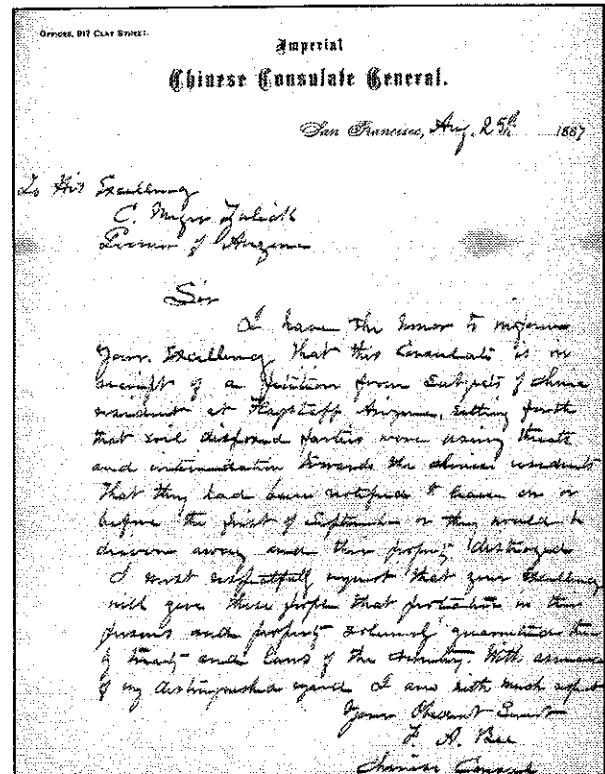
## STRATEGIC PLAN

### Goal: ACCESS

Improve the skill level of professionals and non-professionals who have custody of historical materials. Increase visibility and knowledge of historical materials amongst audiences through development of shared internet resources.

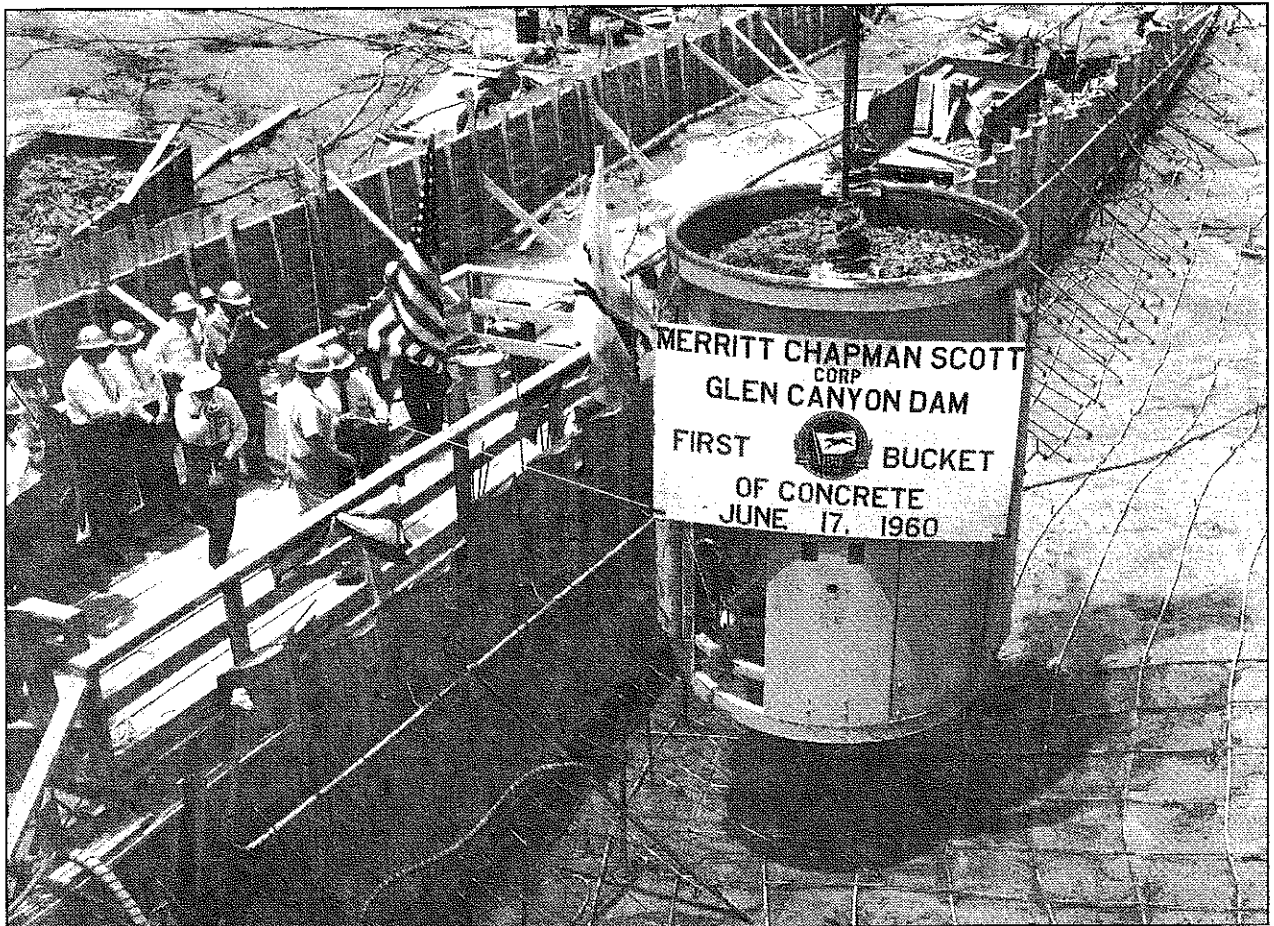
### Objectives:

1. Seek external funding to support continuing education directed at those individuals with custody of historical materials and demonstrated need for collections management training.
2. Facilitate development of collaborative information systems and implementation of descriptive standards for professionals.
3. Update and expand the *Arizona Cultural Inventory Project*, a particularly valuable resource that presents information about the broad spectrum of institutions that possess historical records of enduring value.
4. Seek re-grant from NHPRC to fund institutional grant projects
5. Establish and promote an archival portal that provides links to existing online resources including:
  - *Arizona Cultural Inventory Project*
  - *Arizona Archives Online*
  - *Yavapai Heritage Roundup*
  - *Colorado Plateau Digital Archives*
  - *The Arizona Memory Project*
  - *Arizona Centennial*
  - Websites of allied Arizona organizations such as the coordinating committee for History in Arizona, the Museum Association of Arizona and the Arizona Paper and Photograph Conservation Group
  - Archival and museum events
  - A master calendar of training opportunities provided by Arizona organizations and institutions
6. Facilitate and support participation of Arizona repositories in the Arizona Memory Project , a statewide digitization initiative
7. Continue to promote and publicize the preservation and access to electronic records of state and local governments

8. Continue to promote and publicize the preservation and access to electronic records of state and local governments
9. Support additional efforts to seek external funding to expand *Arizona Archives Online*
10. Support the best professional practices for culturally sensitive care and use of Native American archival material and evaluate the Protocols for Native American Archival Materials as they apply to the Indigenous peoples of Arizona

**Goal: PRESERVATION**

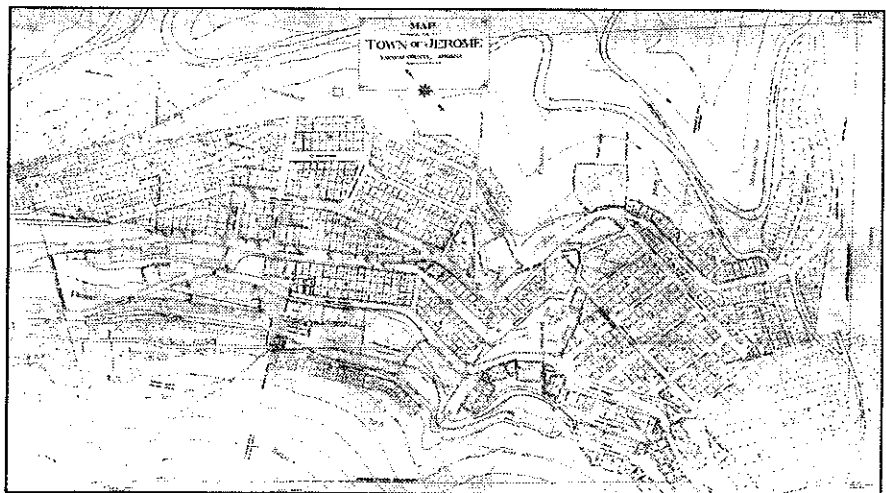
Ensure the continued accessibility and survival of historical material, especially vital records, through increased conservation work, collaborative preservation planning, disaster preparedness and staff training and public education.

**Objectives:**

1. Offer preservation workshops and seminars to organizations and individuals with custody of archives and public records.
2. Support the statewide initiative for emergency and disaster recovery training for records of state and local governments.
3. Using the directory information found in the updated *Arizona Cultural Inventory Project*, conduct a statewide preservation assessment survey to identify existing conditions and specific facilities and training needs of records repositories across the state.
4. Using the institutional collecting policies located in the *Arizona Cultural Inventory Project*, to identify undocumented or under-documented subjects and seek institutions willing to collect in those areas to be explored at the planned Arizona Archives Summit
5. Define and explain to the public and records custodians the significance of vital and historical records.
6. Support continued microfilming and digitization of Arizona newspapers.
7. Designate eligible landmark court cases for preservation under the Arizona Supreme Court's record retention and disposition schedule

### **GOAL: PROMOTION**

Increase visibility of historical records community through preparation for Arizona's Centennial, regularly scheduled events, and continuing contacts with popular media, the press and the citizens of Arizona.

1. Support public programs that champion preservation, access and use of historical records such as:
  - The Arizona Convocation
  - Arizona Archives Month
  - National History Day
  - Arizona History Convention
  - Statewide Historic Preservation Partnership Conference
  - History on the Mall
2. Cooperate with others in developing a marketing plan to promote resources available at the Polly Rosenbaum State Archives and History Building.
3. Create and have available a press kit for general use. Develop and distribute Annual Arizona Archives Month press release and facilitate distribution of similar press releases to local media
4. Seek funding, and if successful, develop a brochure highlighting the archival collections of historical records that support and celebrate the Arizona Centennial. . The brochure could be distributed to repositories of historical and cultural heritage.
5. Update AHRAB website to reflect current goals and programs.

## ***GOAL: EDUCATION***

Increase the education and understanding of the value of historical records with the general population, all educational levels, and political figures.

1. Increase the promotional efforts of Archives Month across the state.
2. Develop educational programs for archivists so they can educate their varying constituencies about the value and importance of historical records.
3. Develop a "featured collection/repository" on the Arizona State Library, Archives and Public Records site that rotates on a weekly or monthly. This feature would help to proactively raise awareness of Arizona's rich array of repositories and collections of historical and cultural heritage. Seek additional funding
4. Hire an itinerant archivist/educator that would travel to schools, historical societies, state-wide conferences, and repositories educating people about the value and importance of historical records.

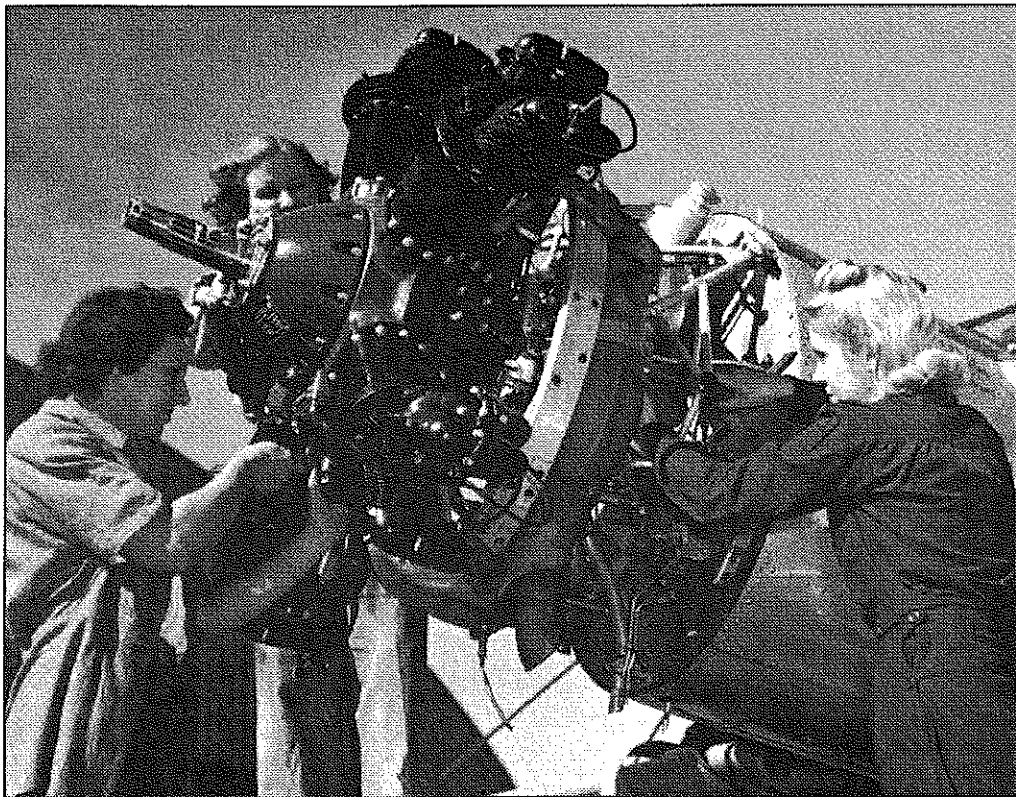
## ***VI. DESIRED OUTCOMES***

- Increased grant proposals to AHRAB and NHPRC. Increase grant proposals from new applicants
- High level of commitment by Board members:
  - each member shall be responsible for specific action plan items;
  - members shall participate in scheduled events
  - members shall be actively involved in review of grant proposals
  - members shall attend and participate in scheduled Board meetings
  - members shall collaborate with one or more organizations for projects relating to the selection and preservation of records
- Increased understanding of the problems of preserving electronic records of archival value and increased capacity of archival programs to acquire and preserve electronic records.

- Develop a greater awareness of the value of historical records and issues related to their preservation and use.
- Promote the increased use of historical records at all educational levels and by the general public.
- Increased attendance at public events sponsored by the historical records and cultural preservation communities

- Increased public awareness through media access
