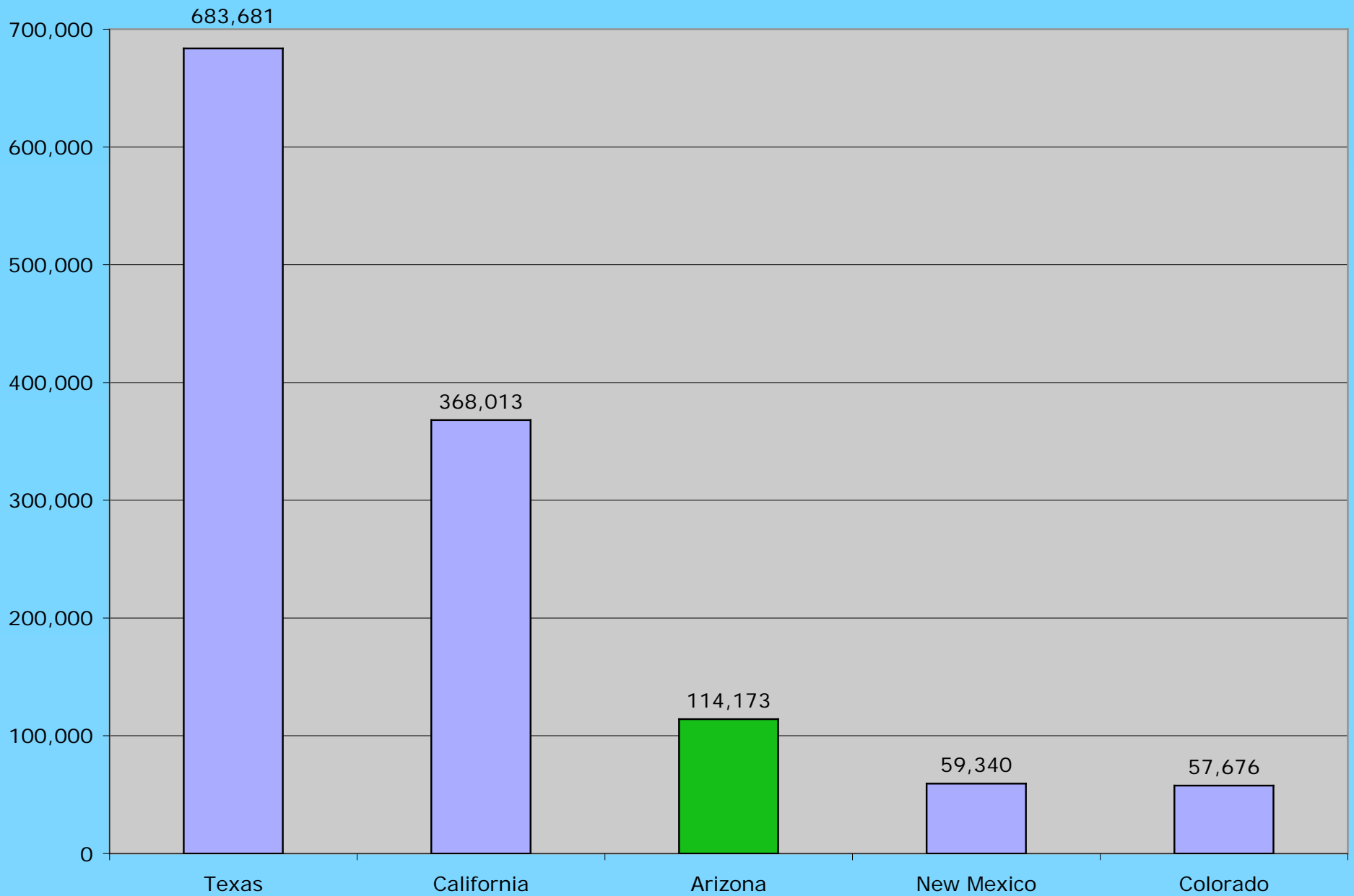
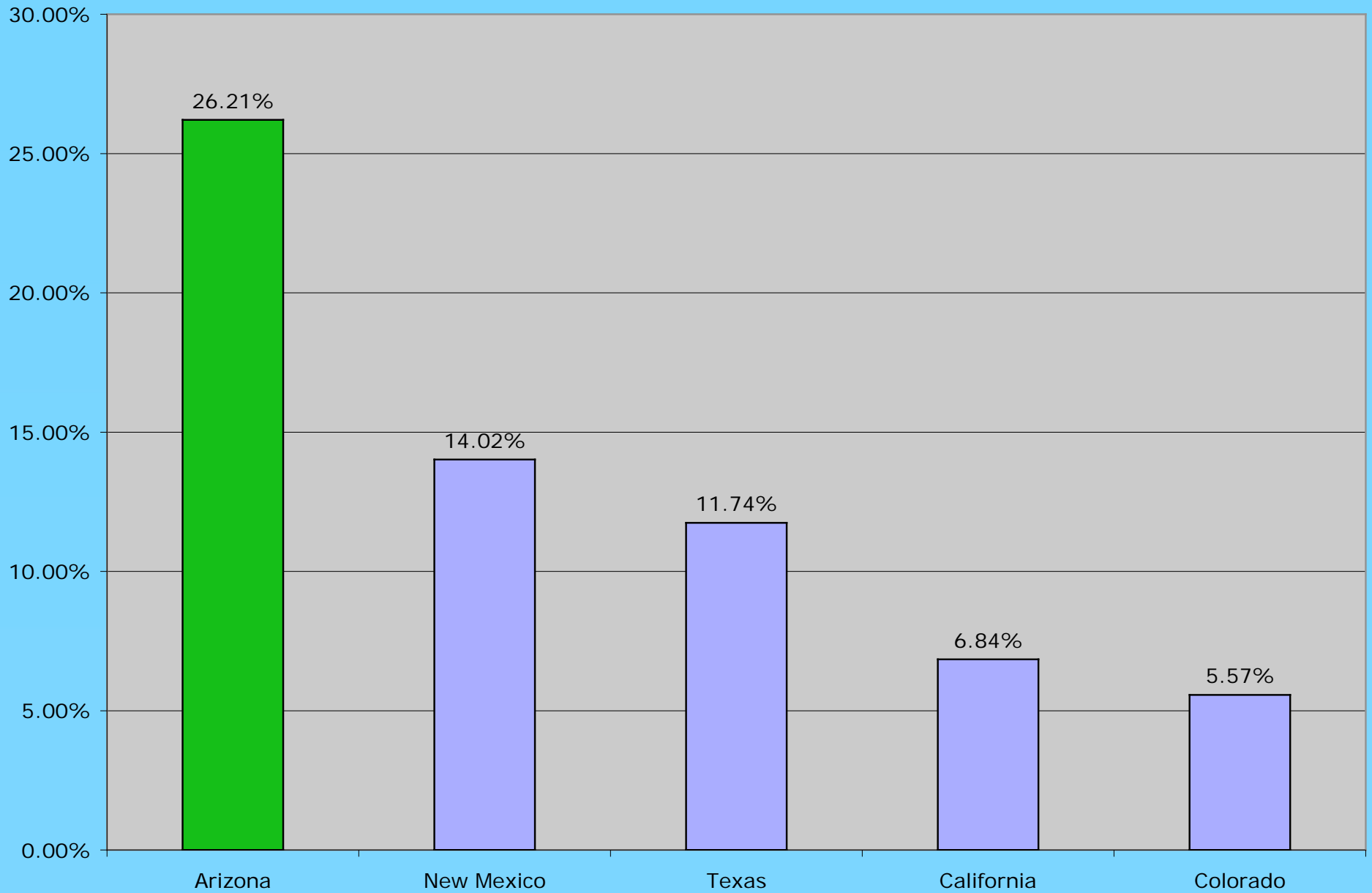


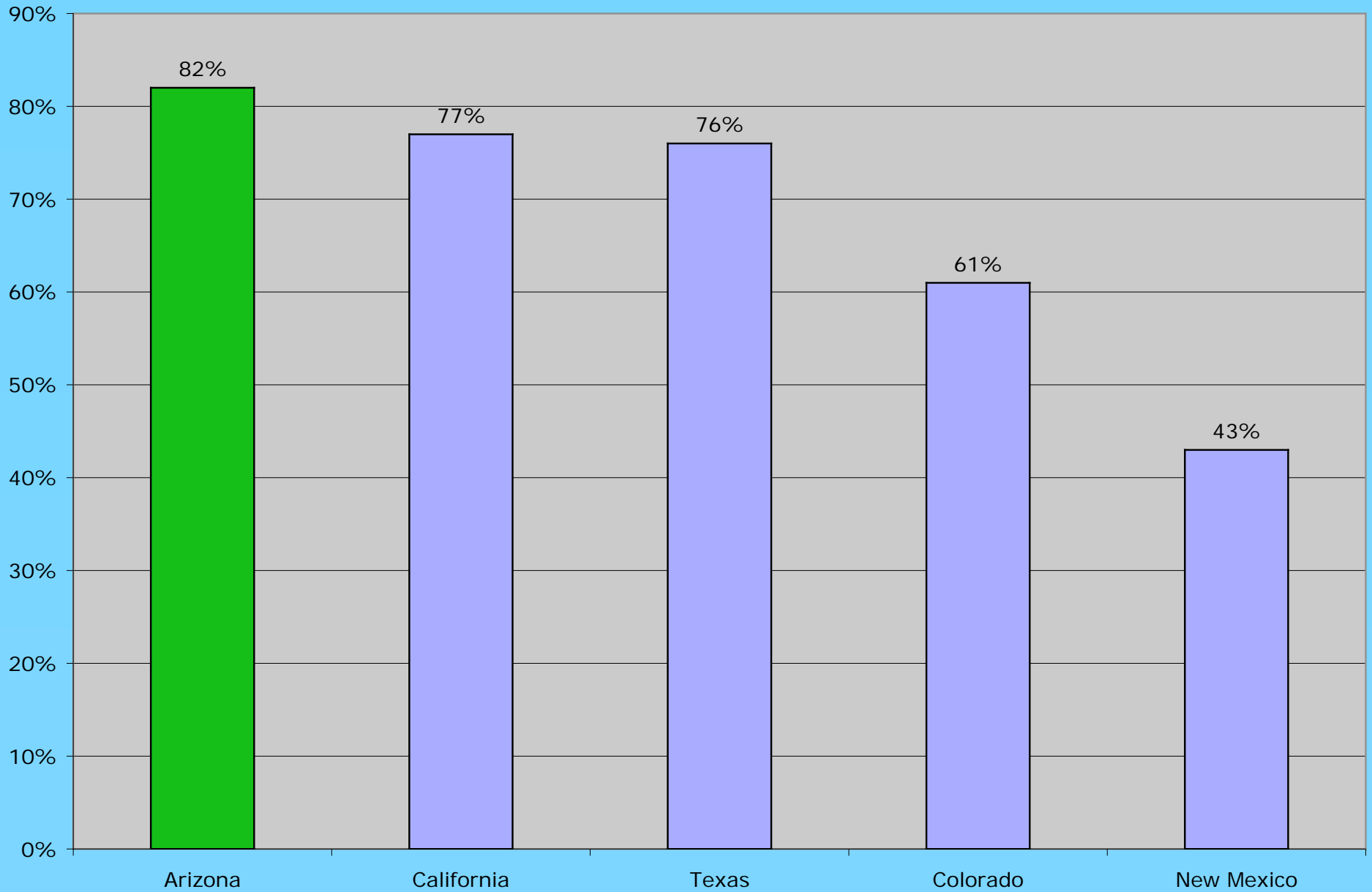
Mexican Population in the Southwest, 1930 (n = 1.3 million)



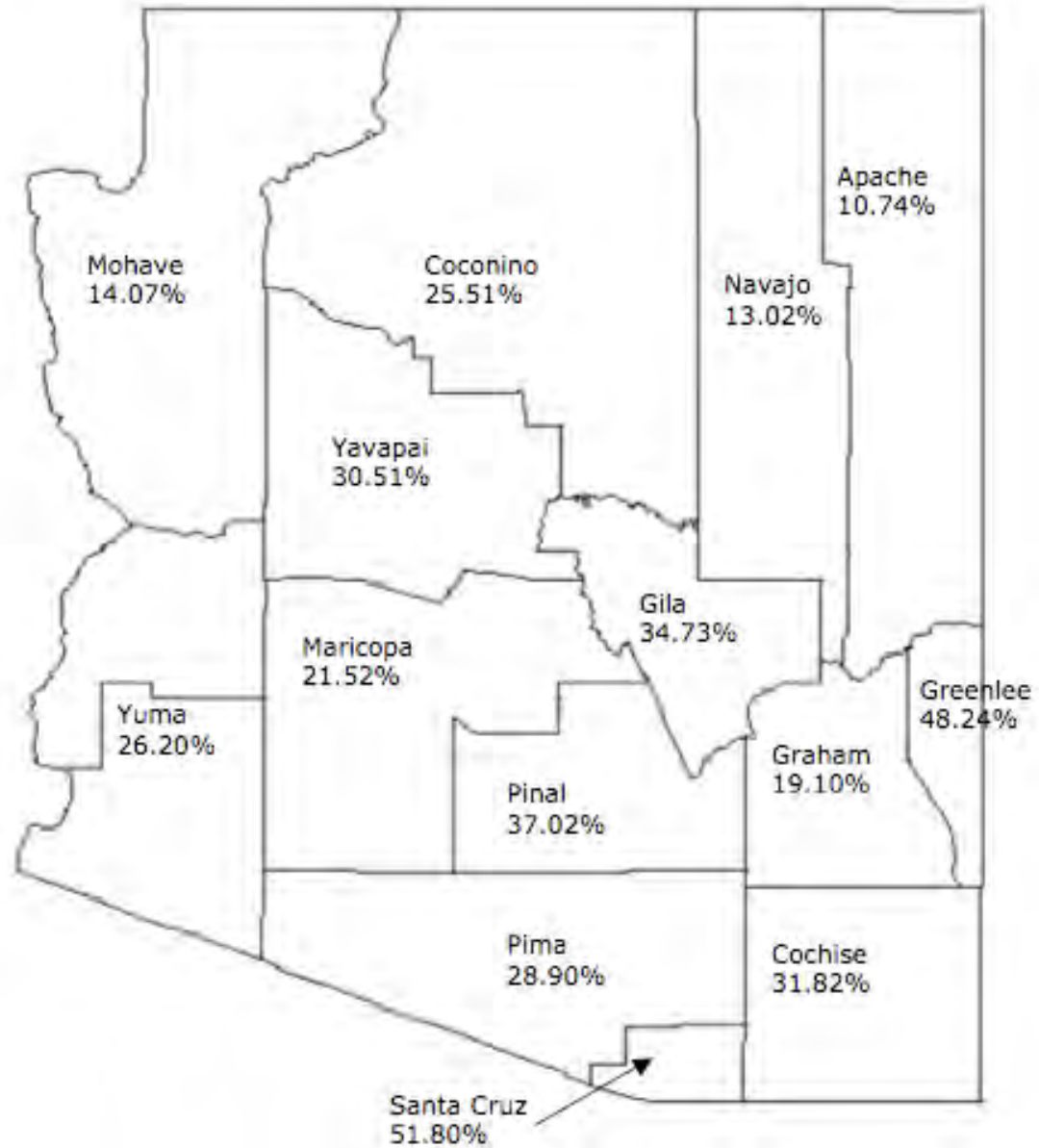
Mexican Population as a Percentage of each State, 1930



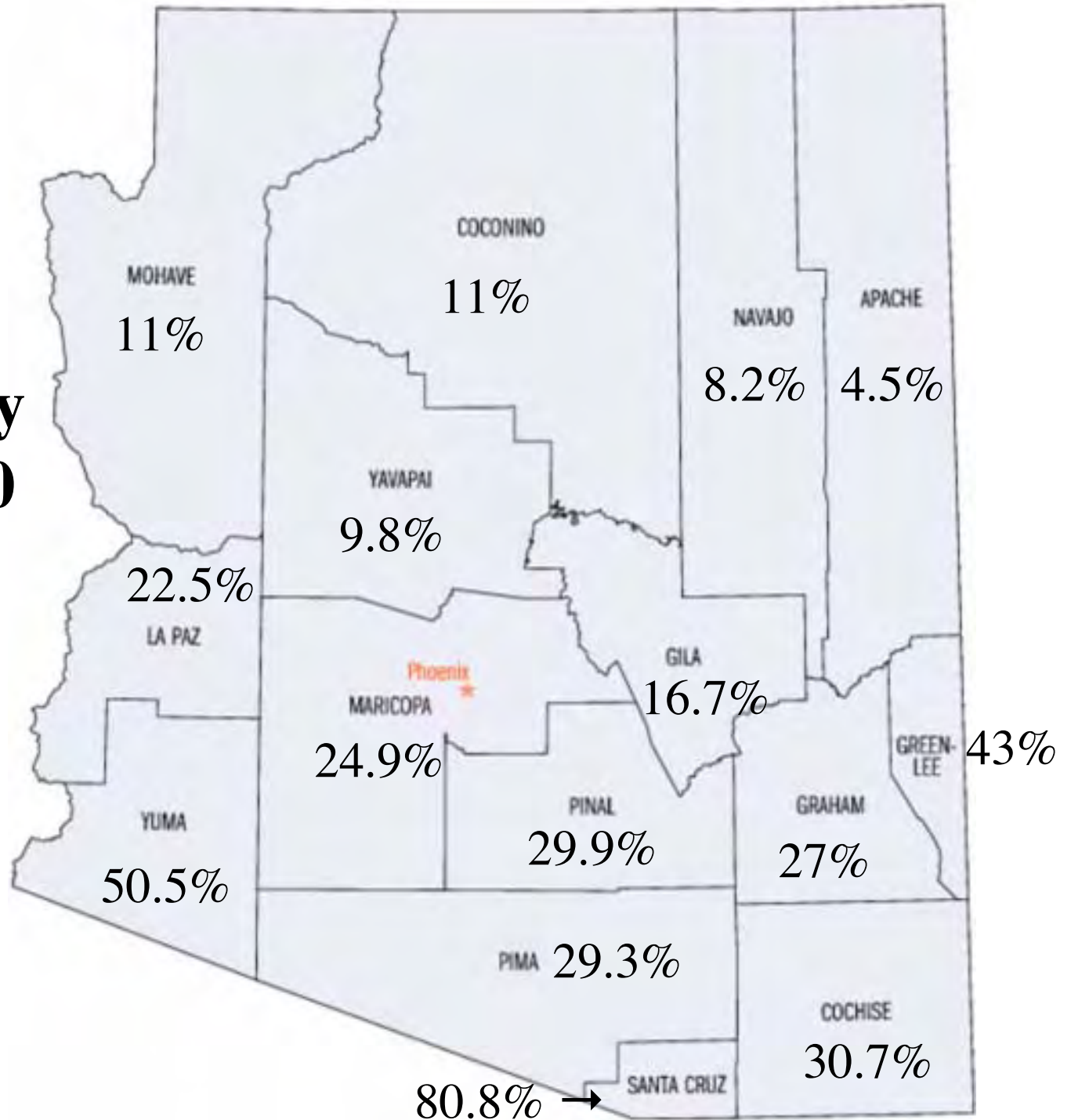
Percentage of Hispanics Claiming Mexican Heritage, 2000

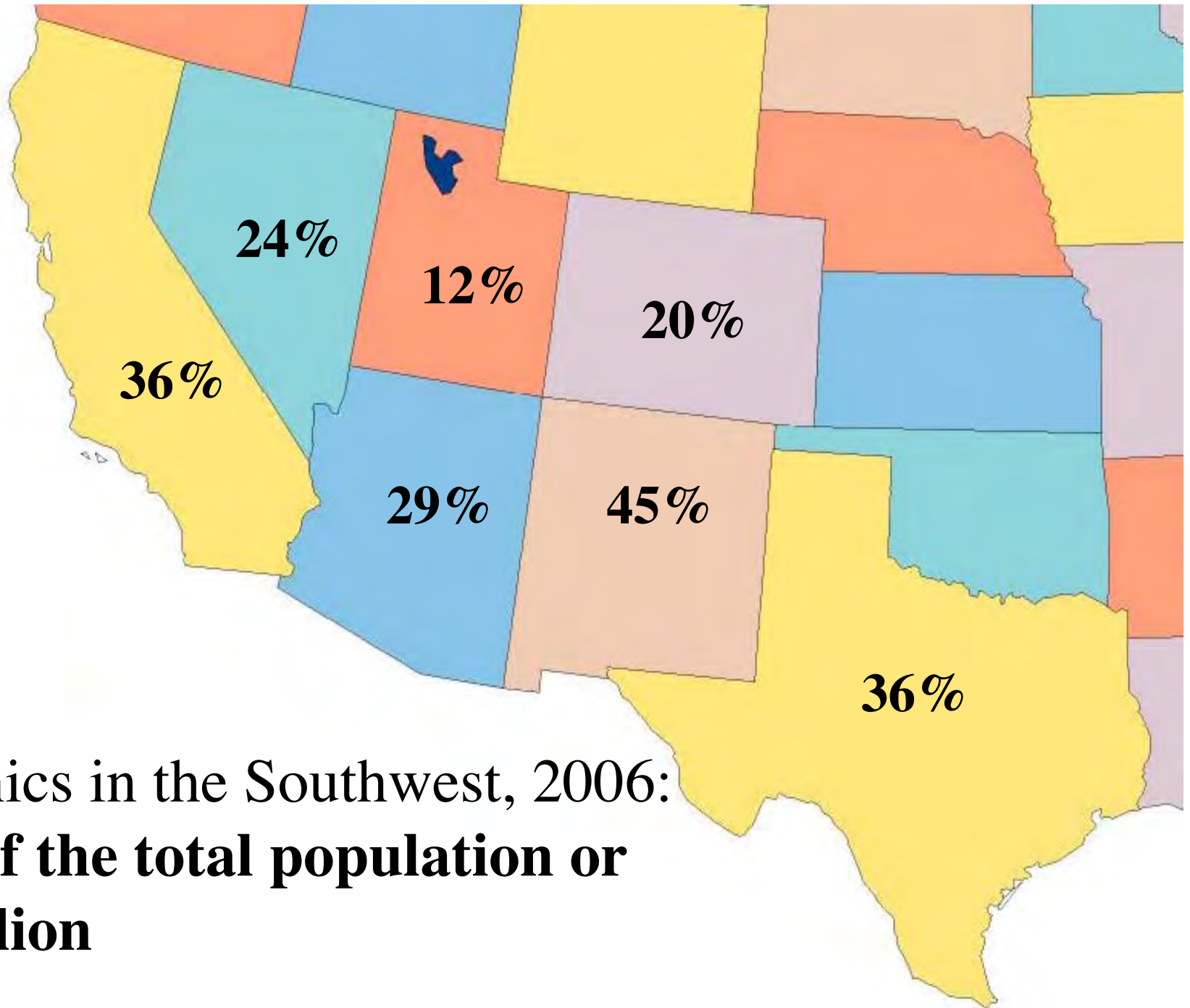


Rates of Mexican Population by County, 1930

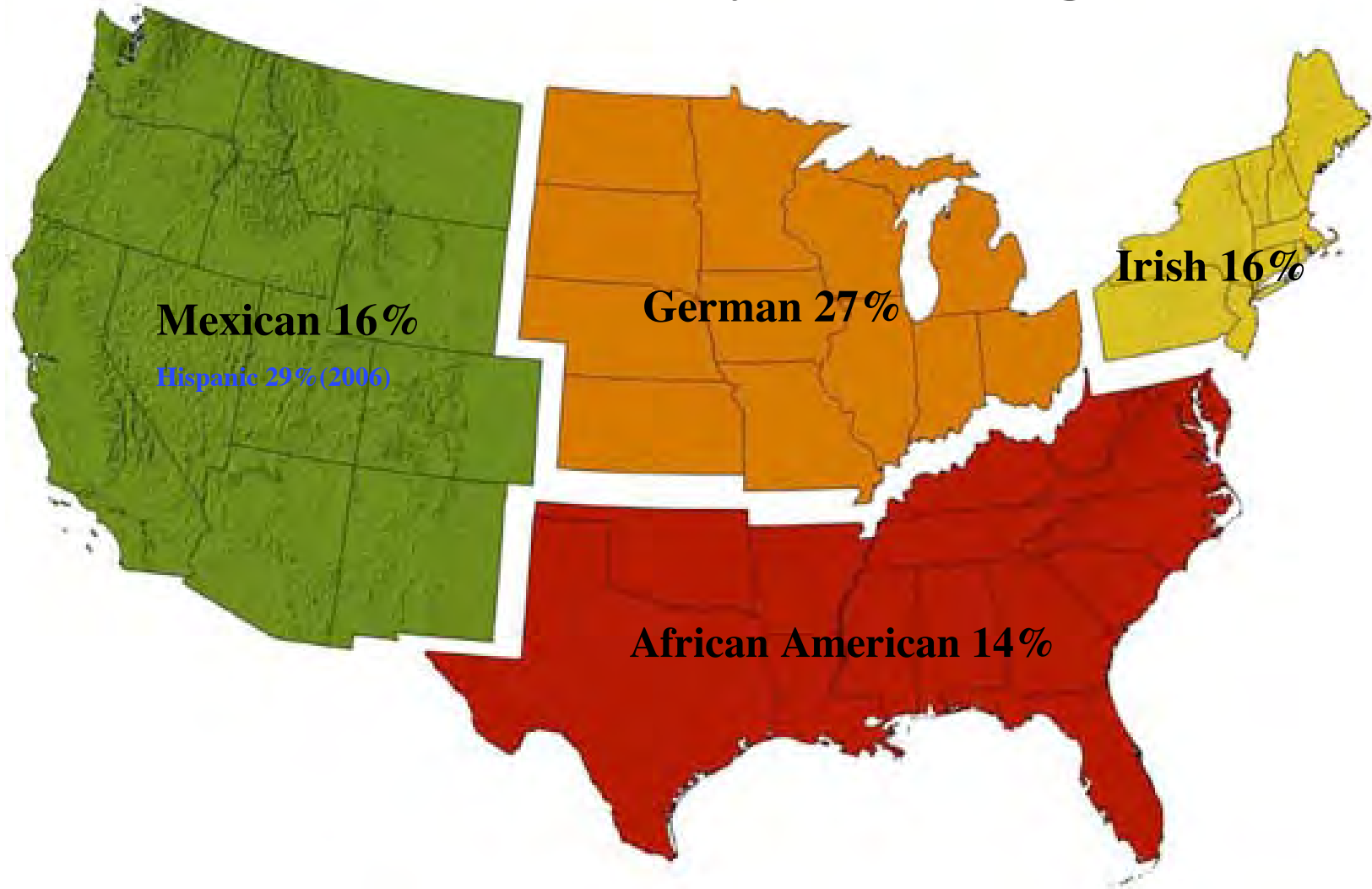
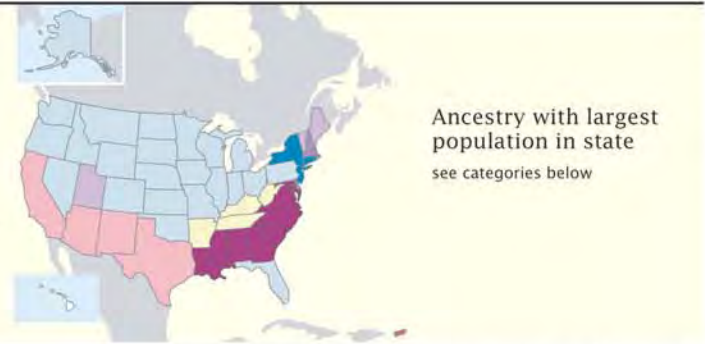


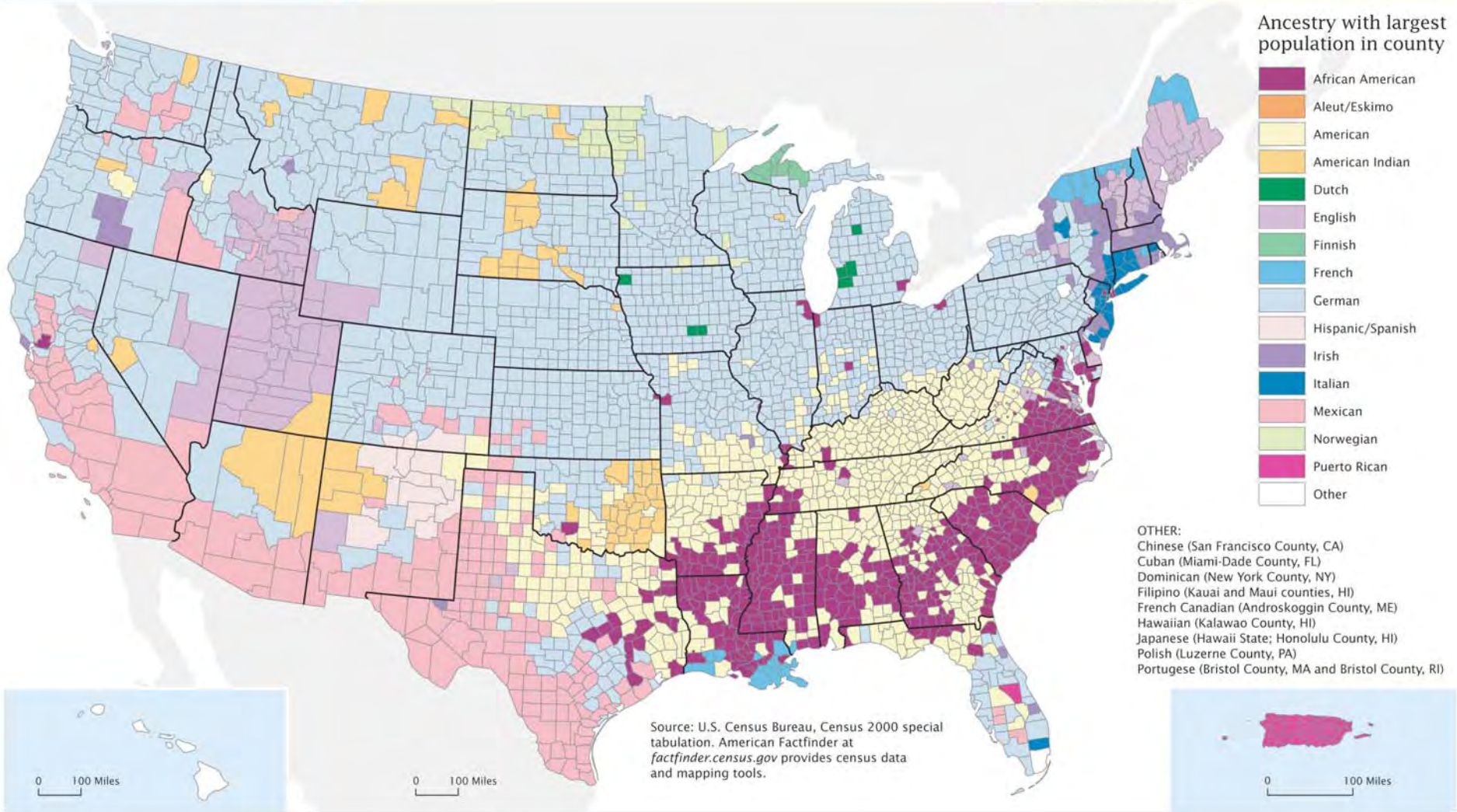

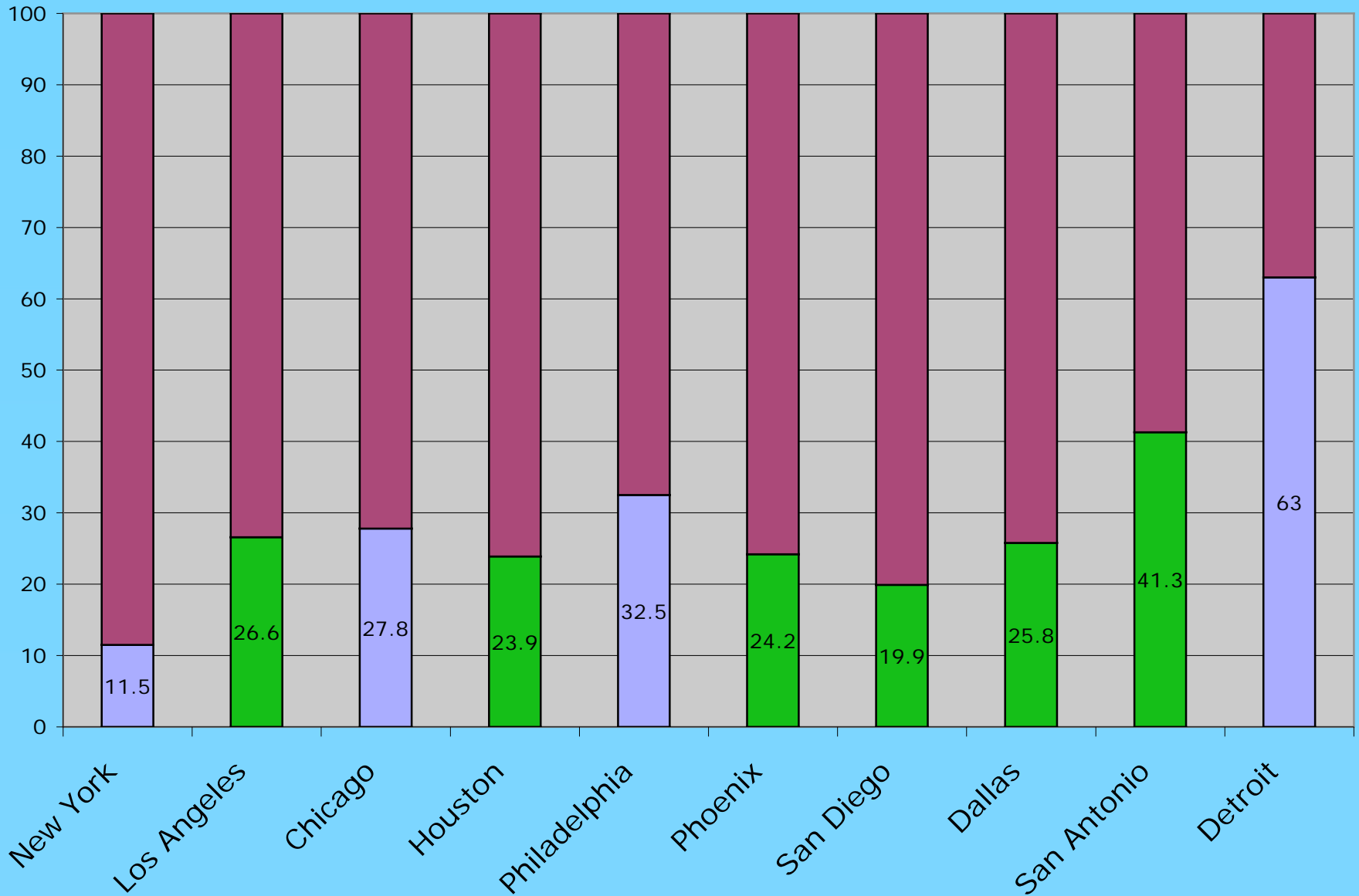

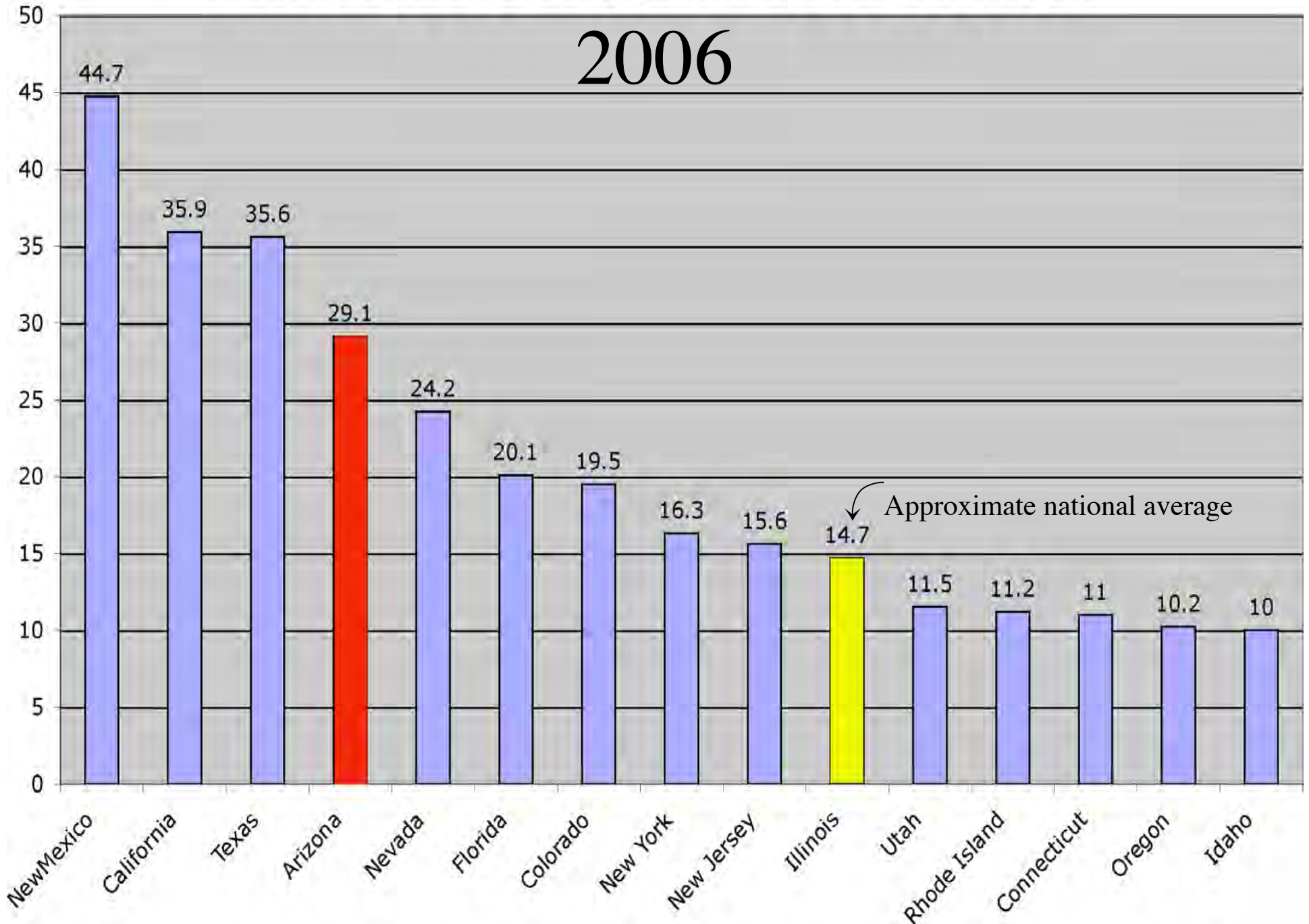
Most Common Ancestry in the Ten Most Populated Cities, 2000

Blue = African American Green = Mexican

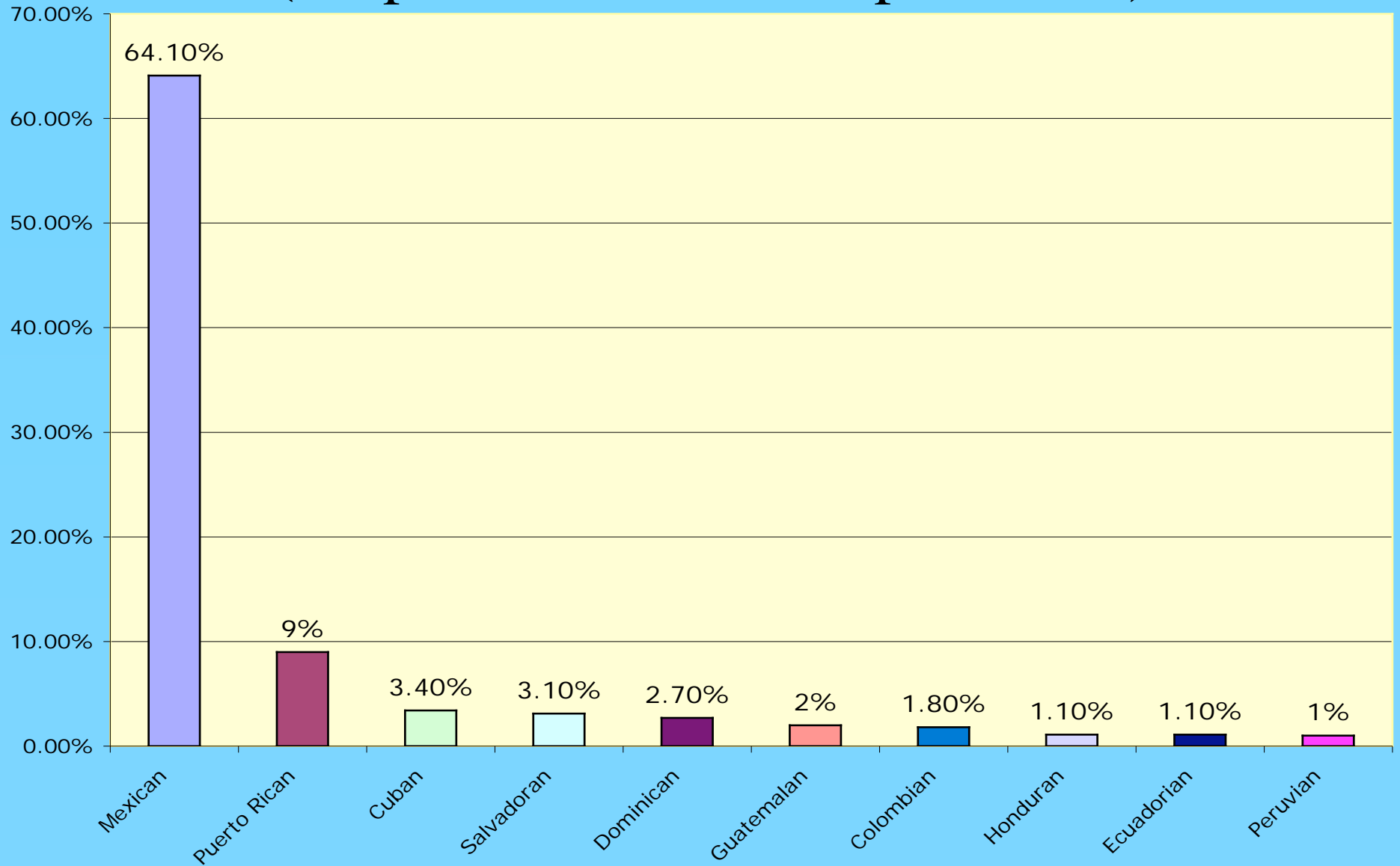


Hispanics as a Percentage of the Total Population

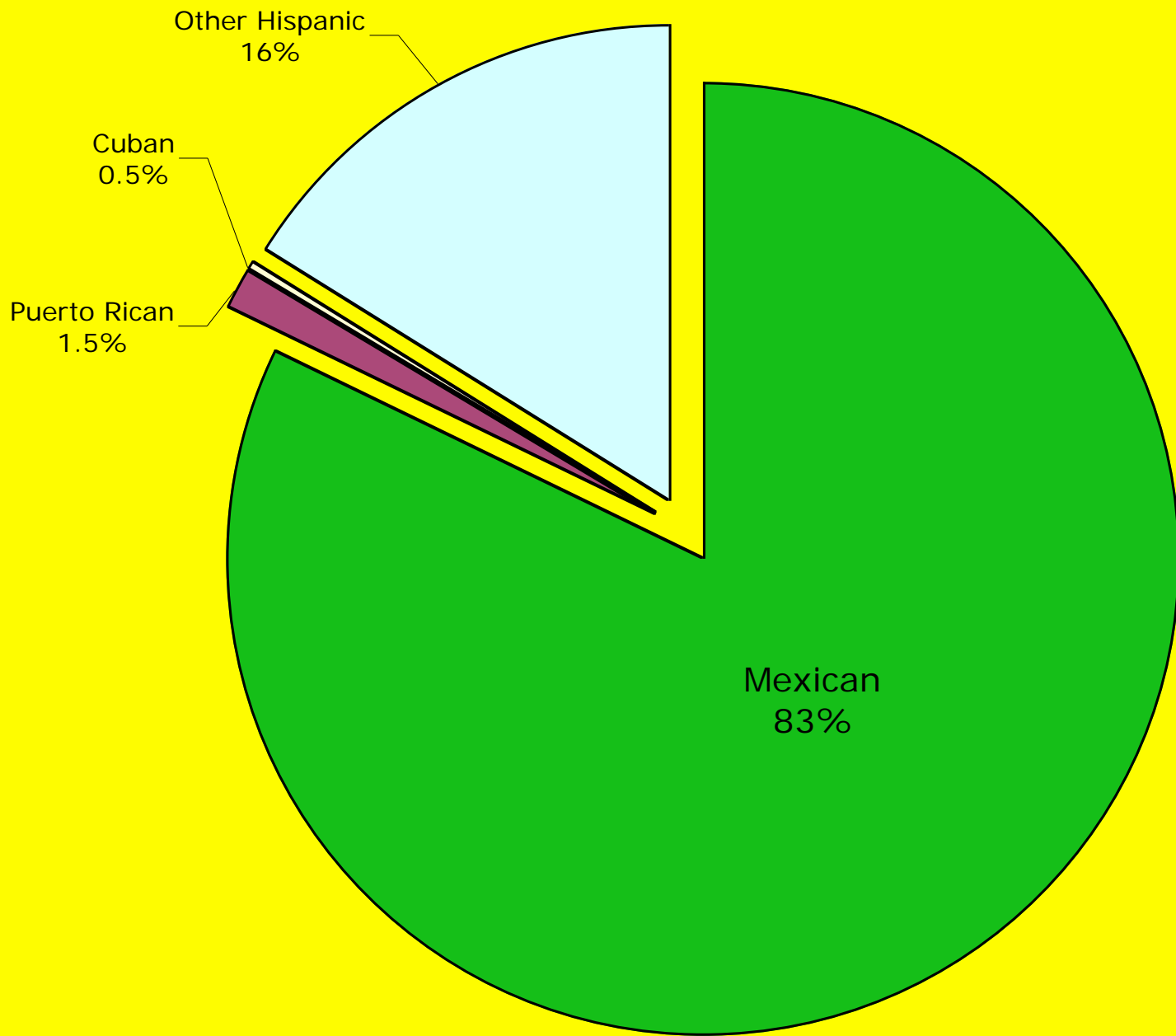

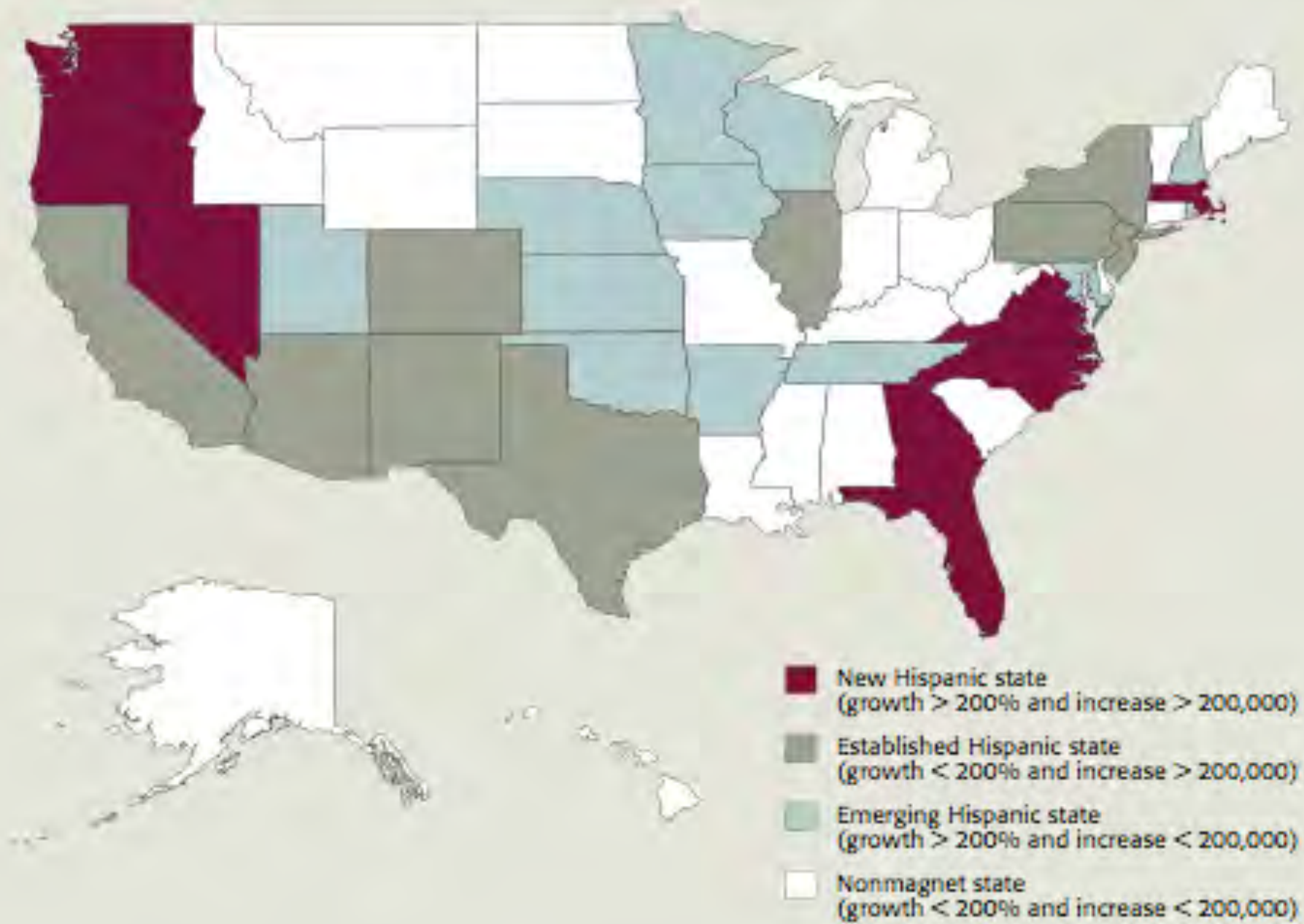
Most Common Ancestries among Hispanics, 2006 (unspecified Latino/Hispanic=6.9)

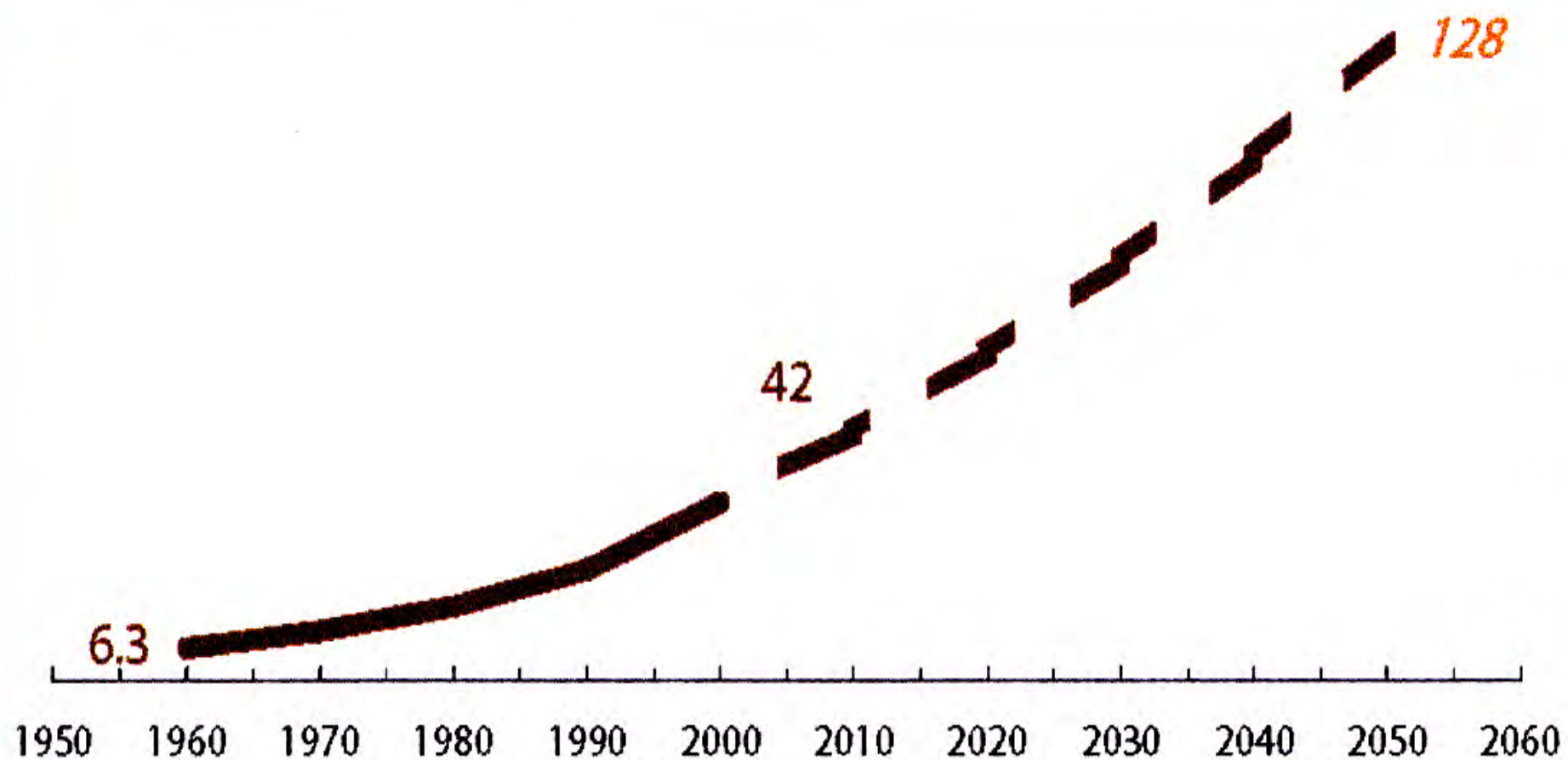


Hispanic Population Growth by State, 1980–2000



Hispanic Population, Actual and Projected: 1960–2050

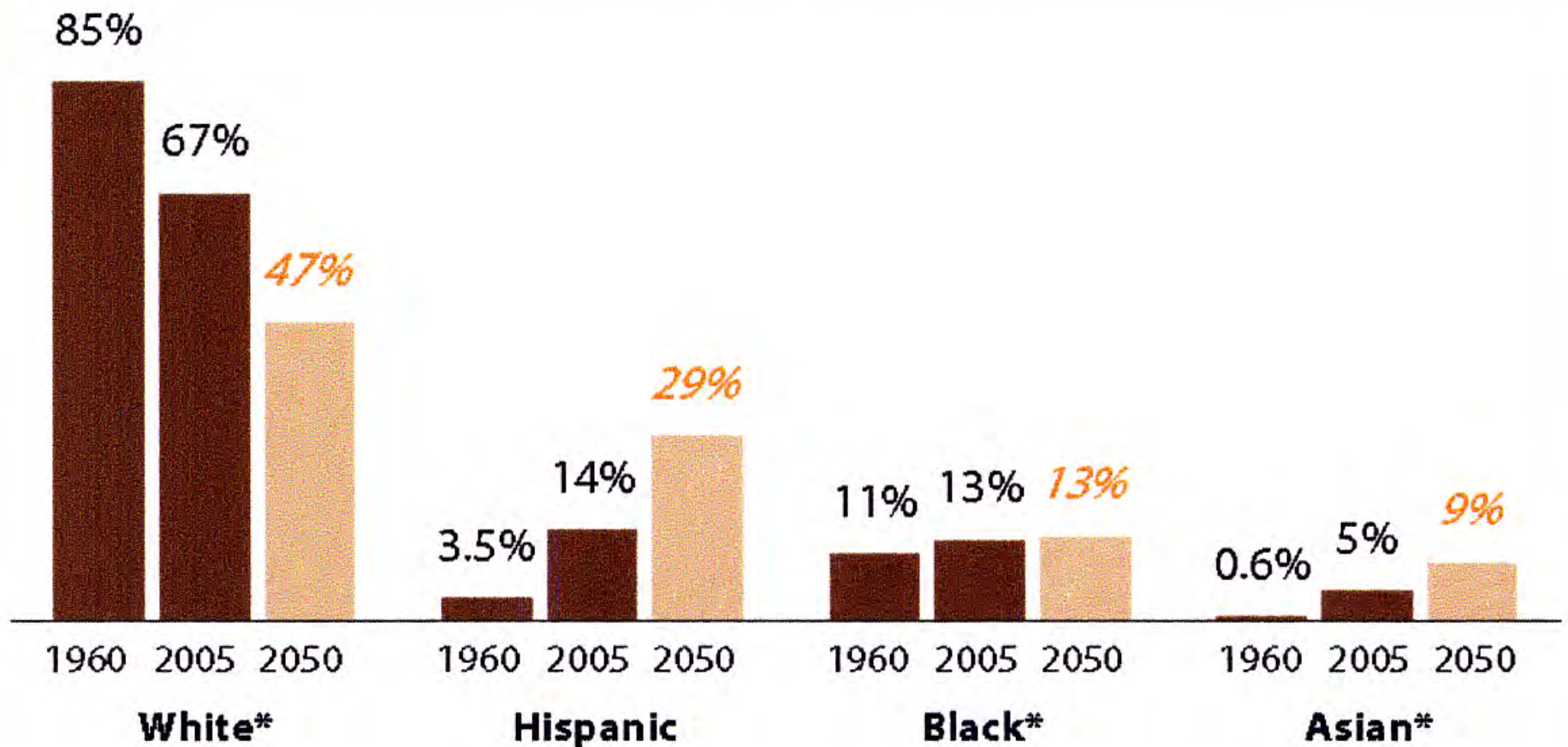

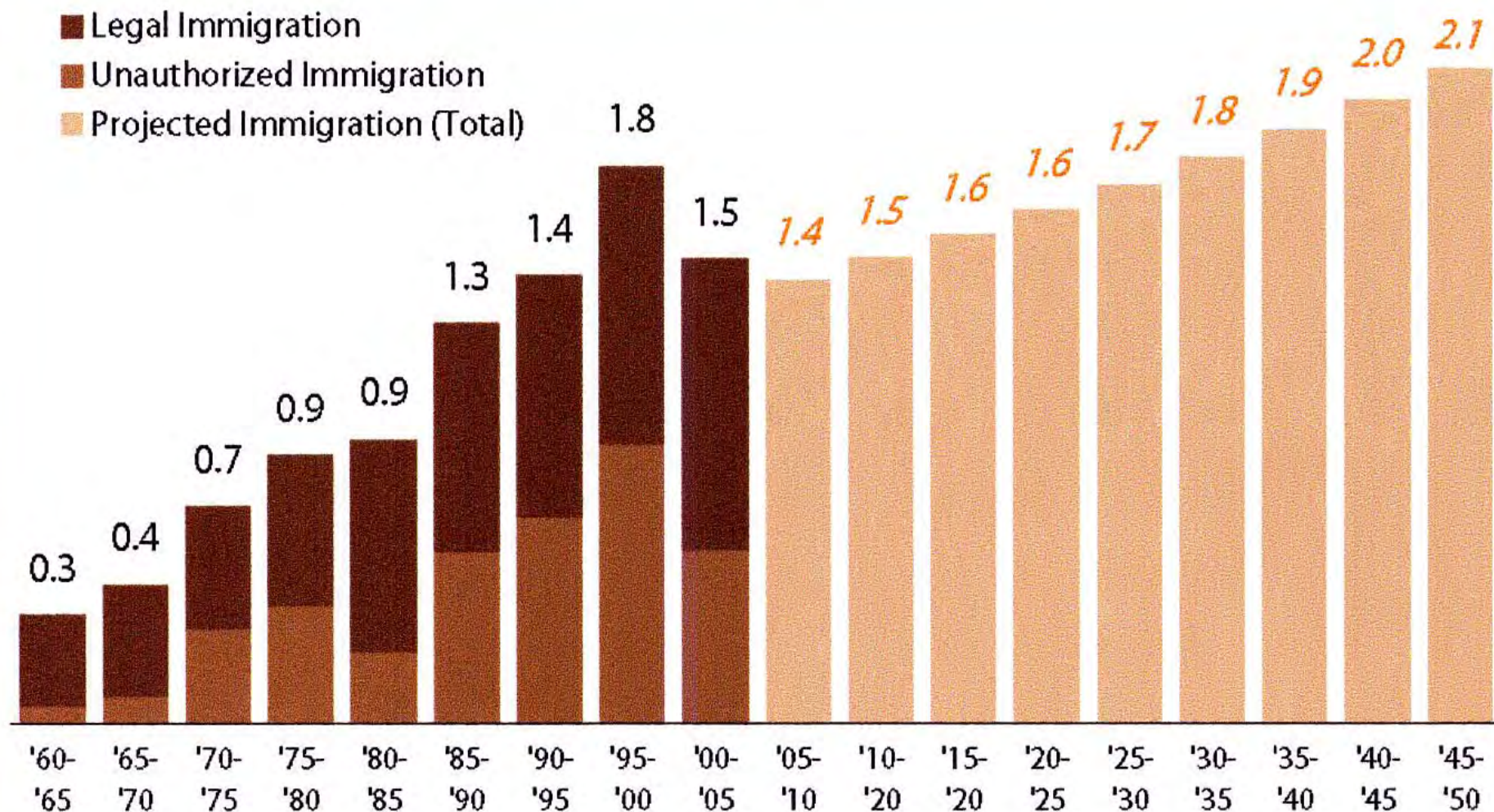
Population by Race and Ethnicity, Actual and Projected:

Actual and Projected Immigration: 1960–1965 through 2045–2050 *(average annual immigrants in millions)*

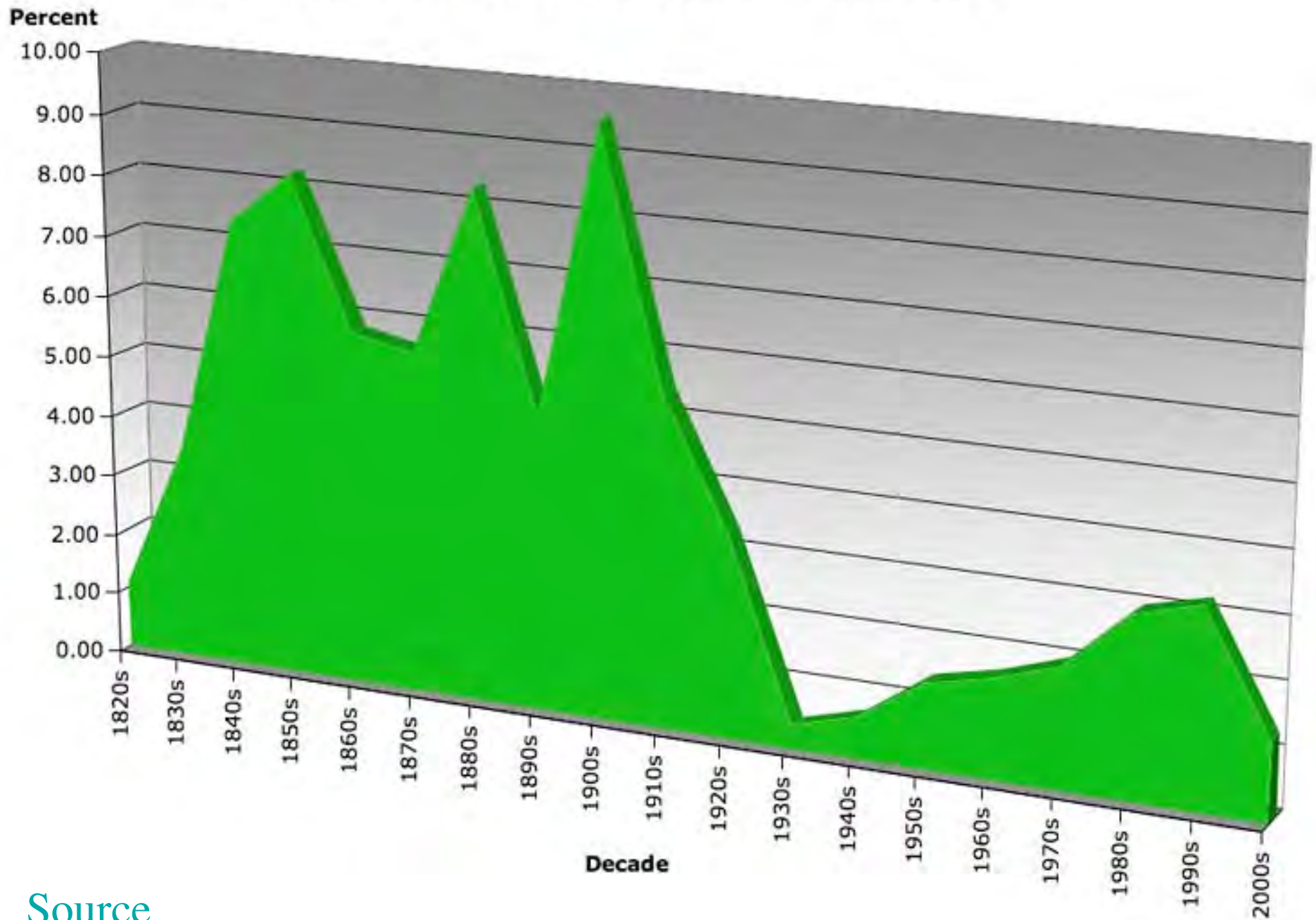

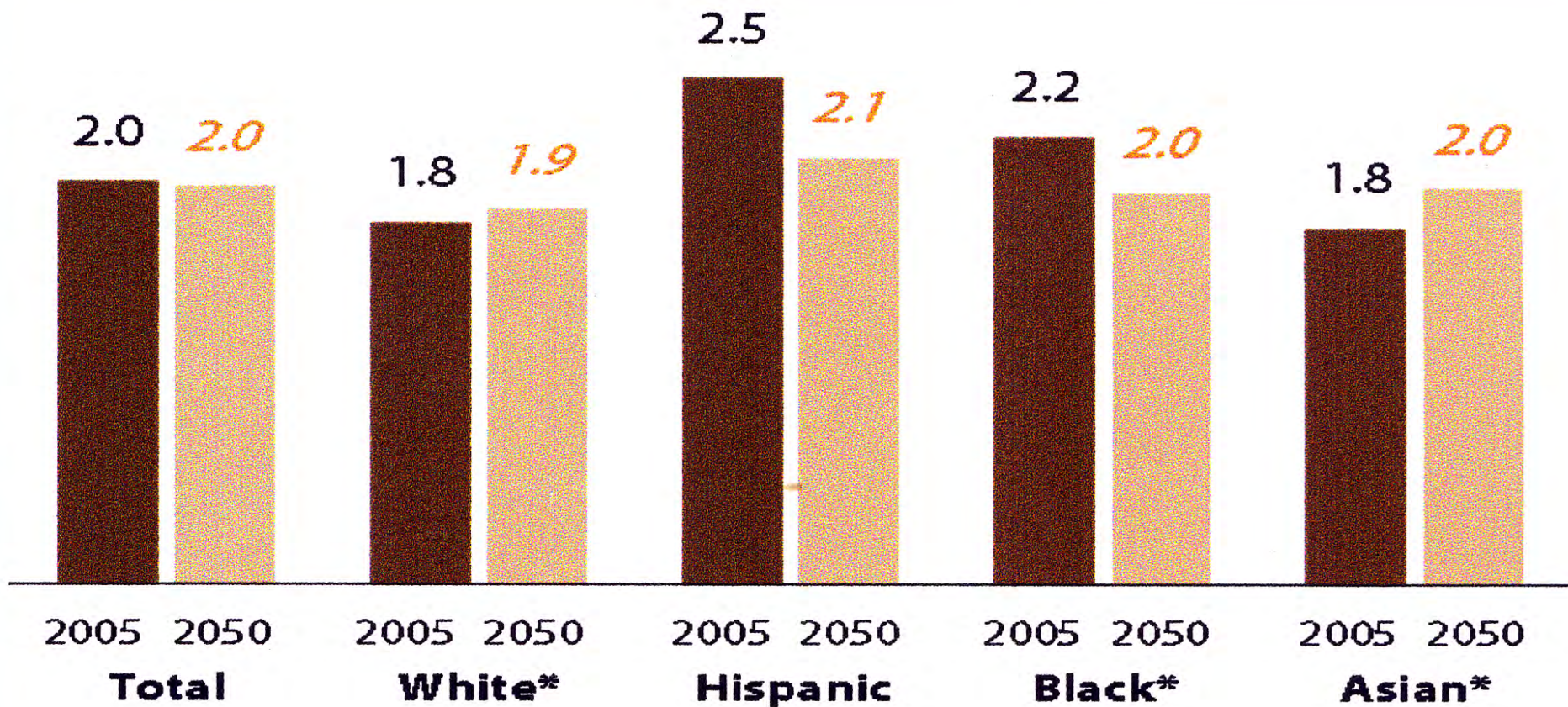

Total Fertility Rate by Race and Ethnicity, Actual and Projected: 2005 and 2050 *(lifetime children per woman)*

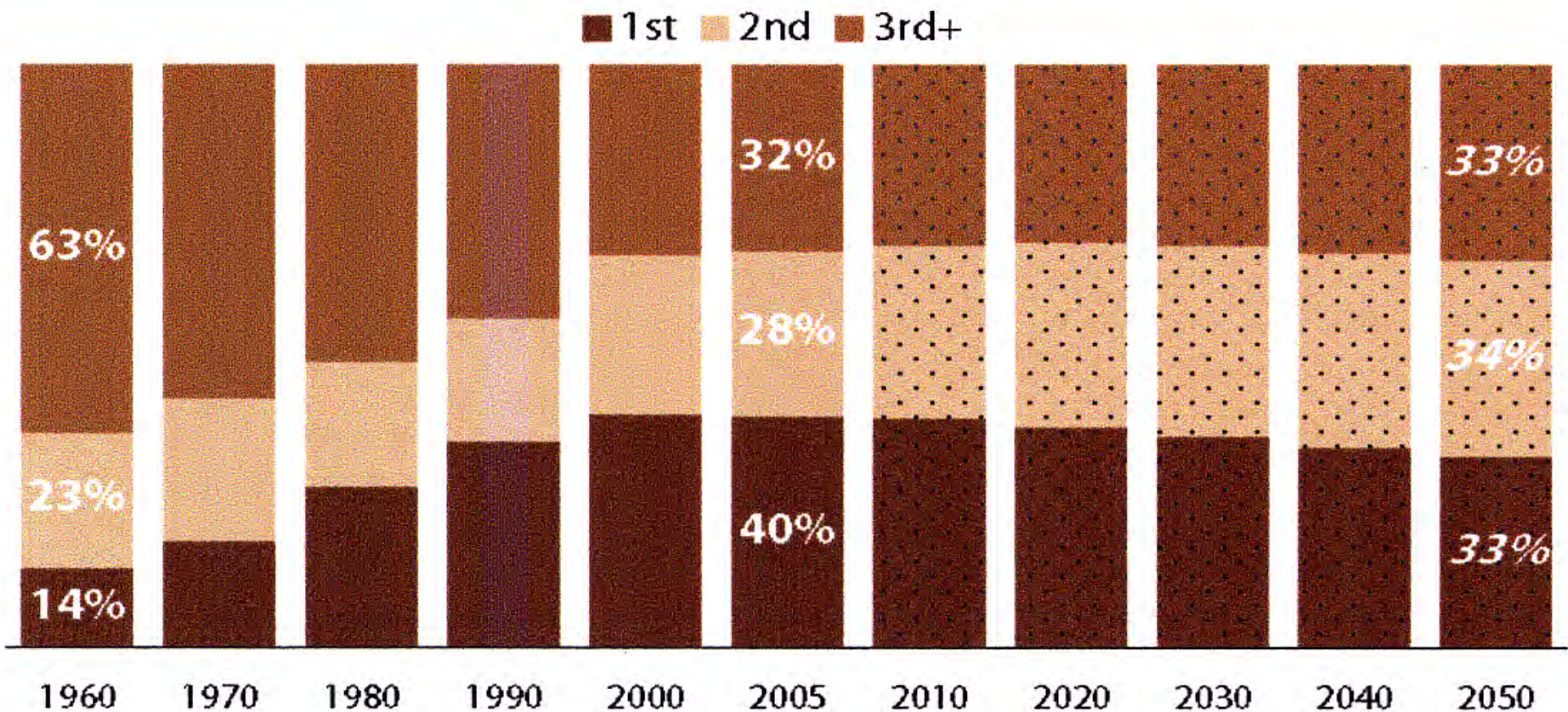

Hispanic Population by Generation, Actual and Projected: 1960–2050

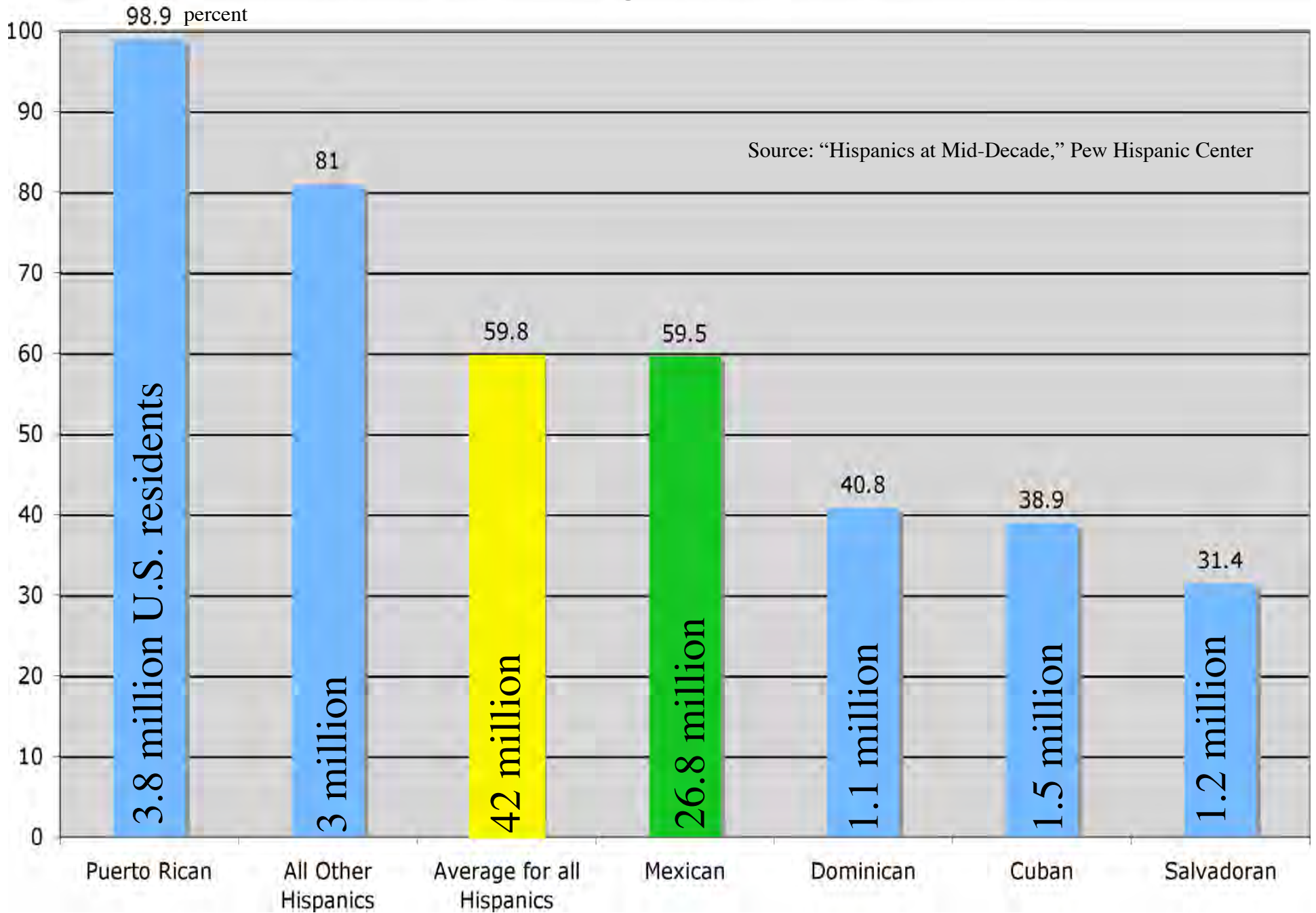
(% in each generation)

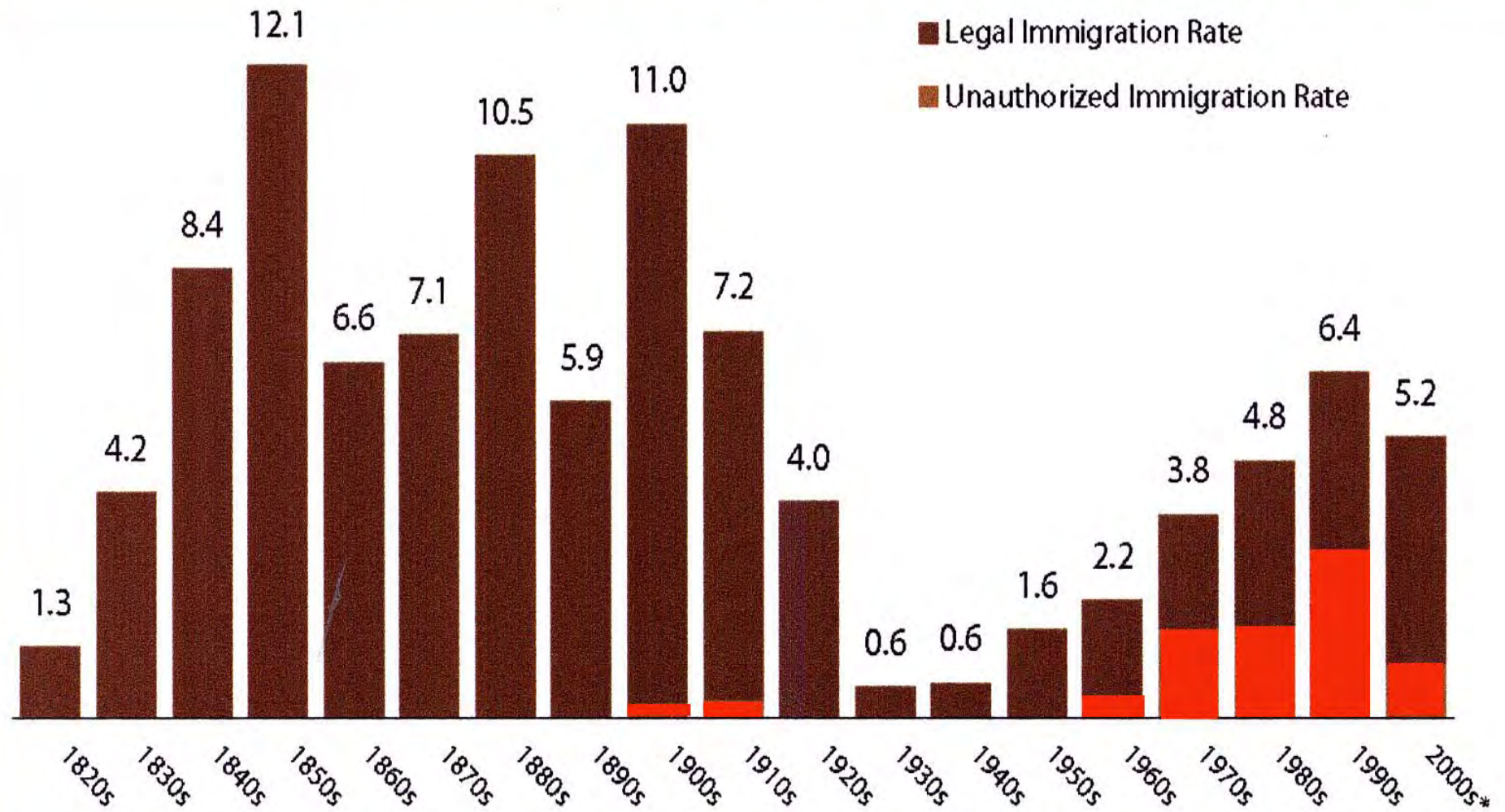

(average annual immigrants per 1,000 population)

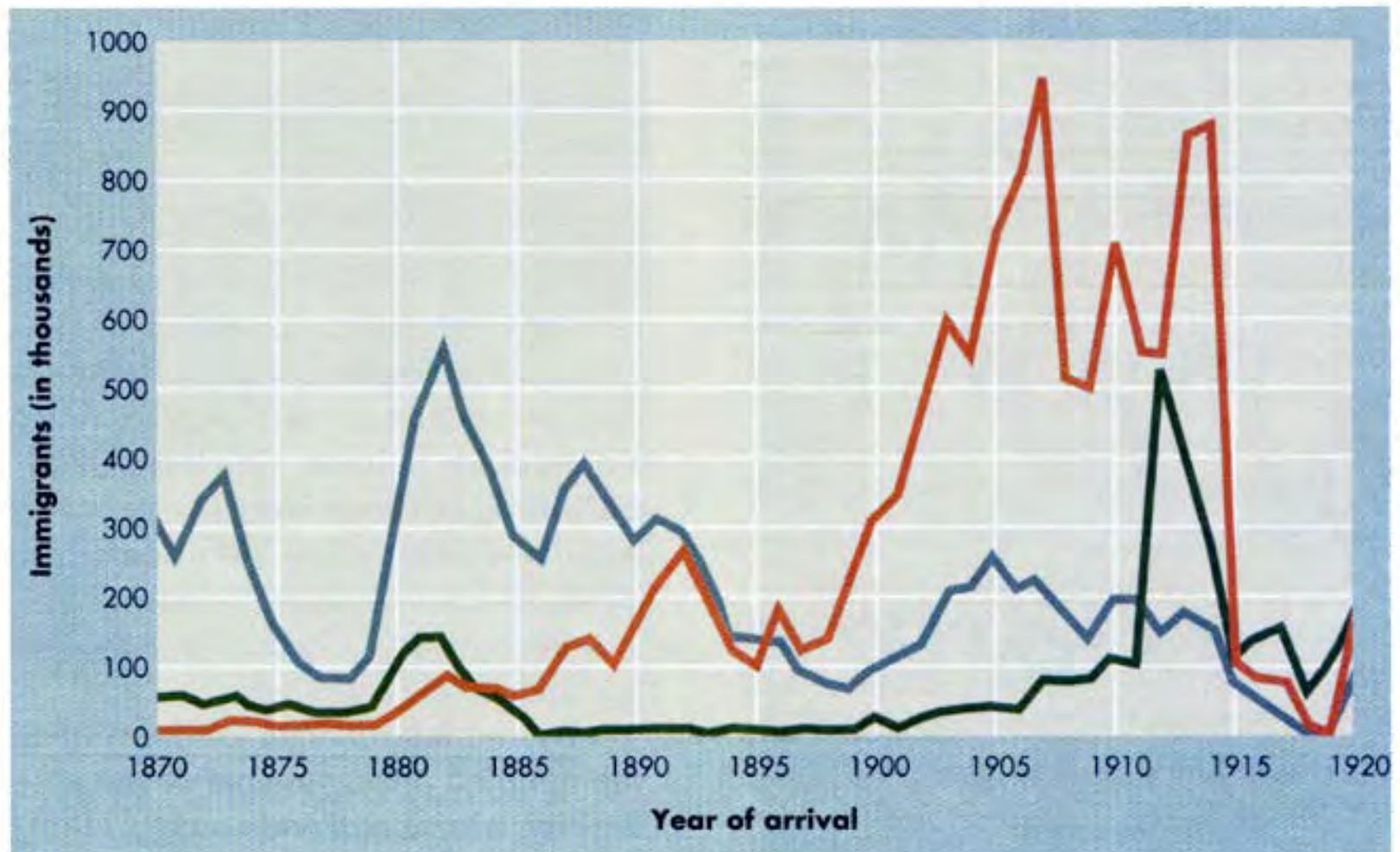

Immigration to the United States, 1870-1920

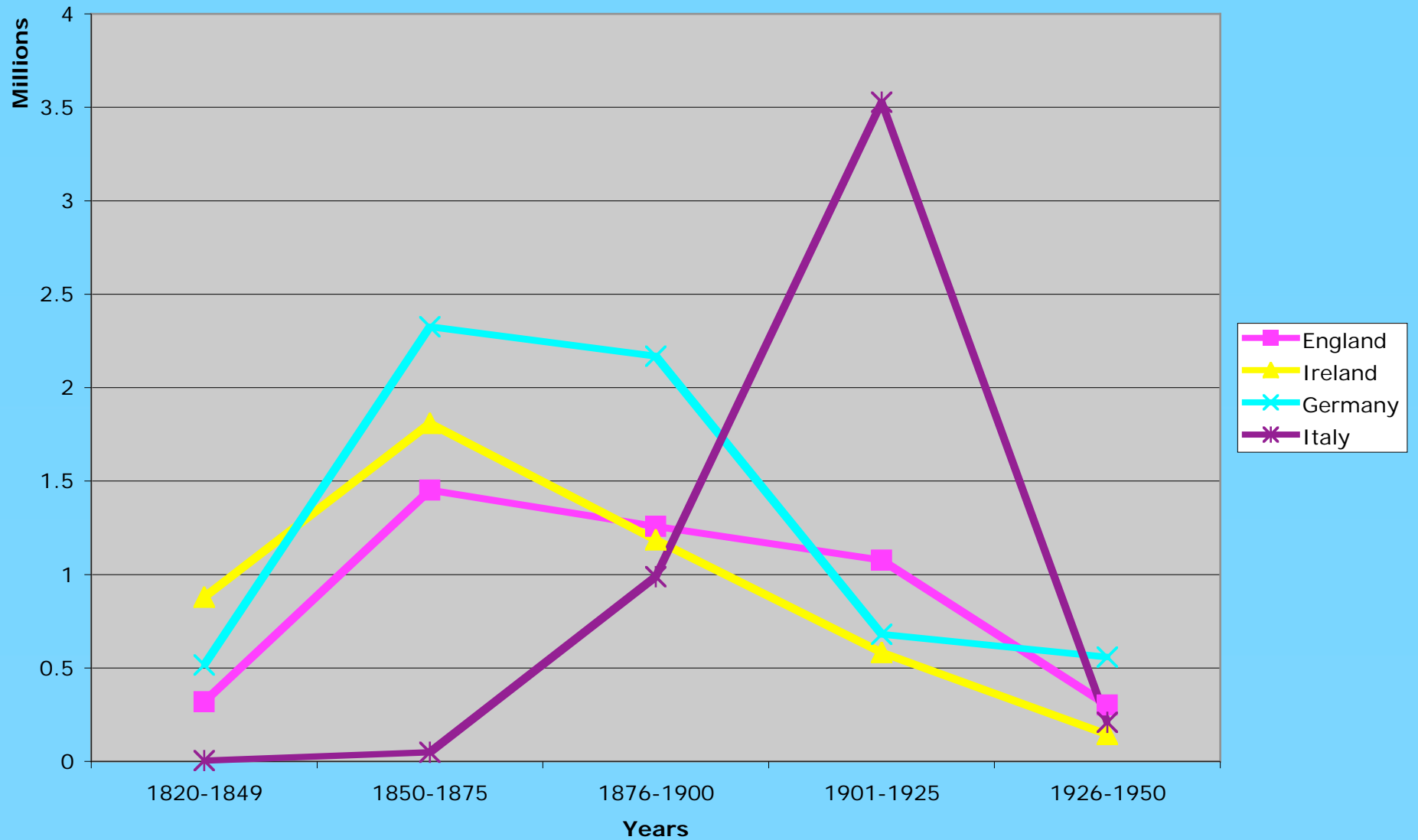

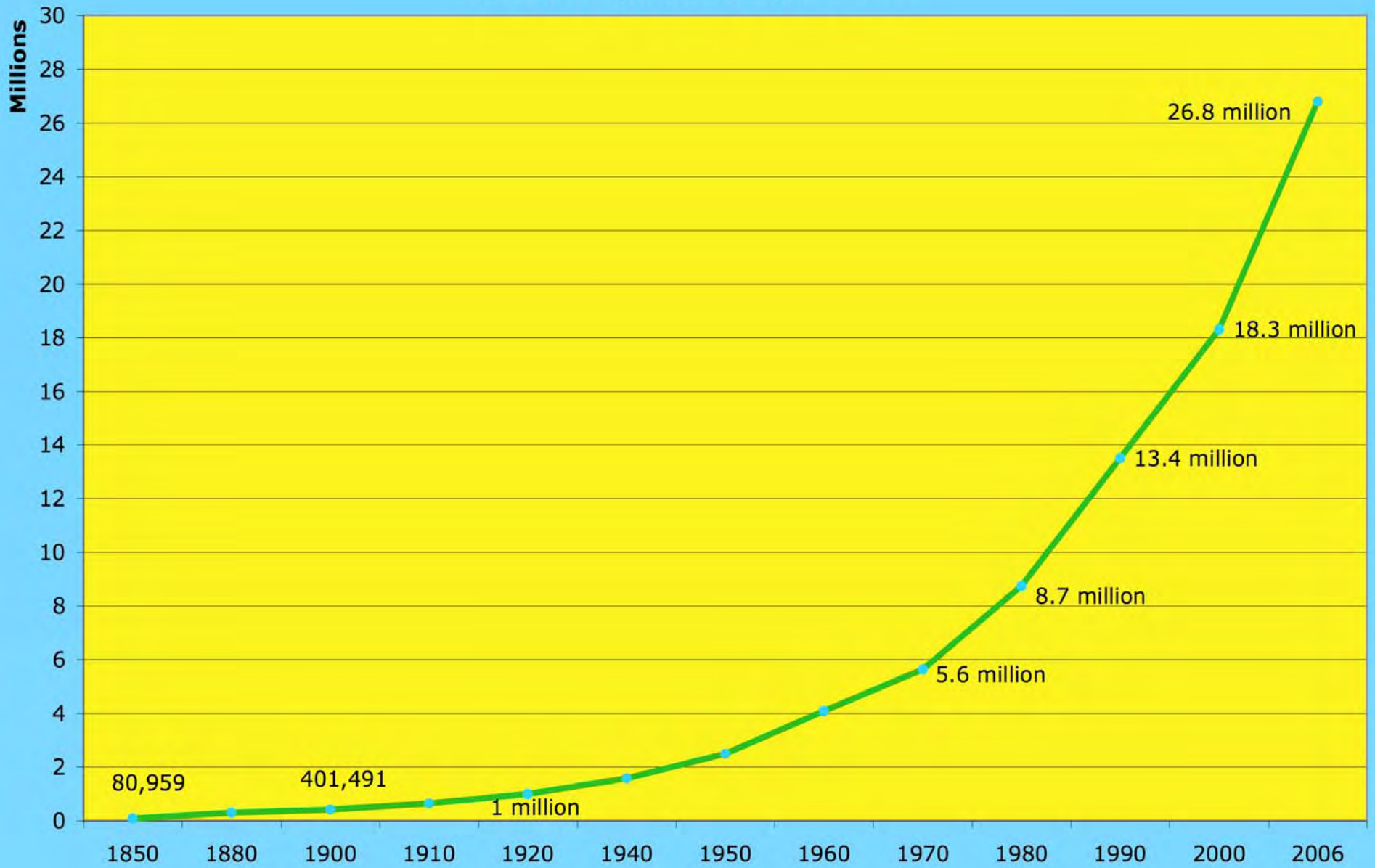

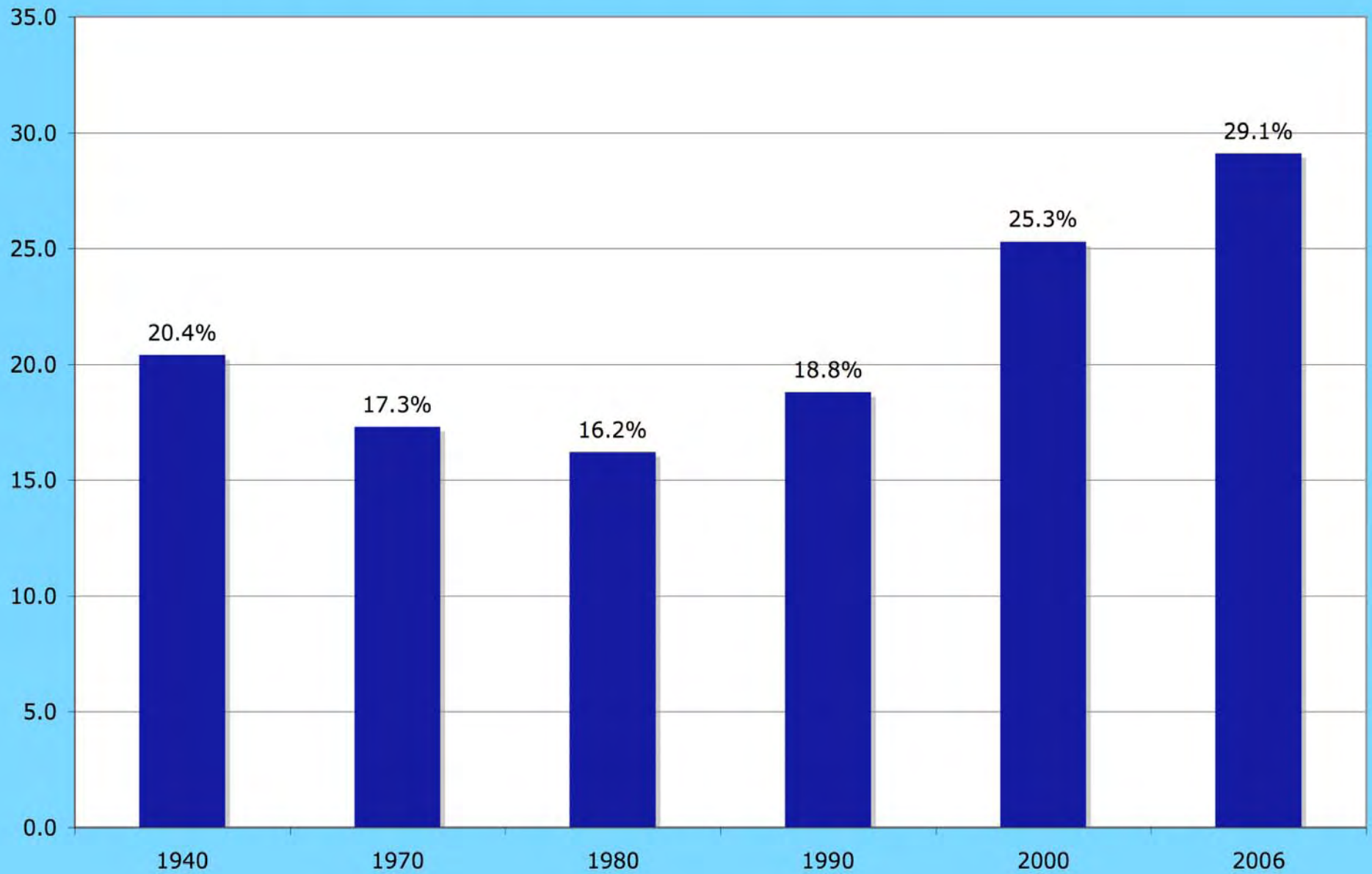
