

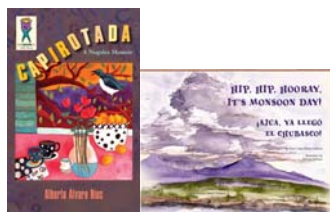

Arizona Women's Hall of Fame Announces Its Newest Inductees



On November 13, 2008 at 3 PM at the Carnegie Center (1101 W. Washington, Phoenix, AZ 85007), four remarkable women will be inducted into the Arizona Women's Hall of Fame: **Betty Accomazzo**, rancher, historian, and author from Laveen; **Katharine Bartlett**, museum professional, anthropologist, and scientist from Flagstaff; **C. Louise Boehringer**, teacher, school superintendent, legislator, and author from Yuma; and **Sister Kathleen Clark**, nurse, child advocate, and social worker from Tucson. Following the induction ceremony dedicated to the memory of **Senator Marilyn Jarrett** (1939-2006), there will be a reception with light refreshments and guests will be able to view the updated Arizona Women's Hall of Fame exhibit, featuring a series of custom made quilts created by the Arizona Quilter's Guild and the Phoenix Quilter's Association. ONEBOOKAZ Titles Chosen for 2009

ONEBOOKAZ will feature two books by Arizona authors, both from Nogales, in 2009. Alberto Rios's *Capirotada: A Nogales Memoir* is the adult selection, while Roni Capin Rivera-Ashford's *Hip, Hip, Hooray, It's Monsoon Day!* is the children's selection. The children's book is the first bilingual ONEBOOKAZ winning title. Six books for adults and six books for kids were nominated for residents of the state to read together in 2008. Arizonans voted online in September to choose the winning titles. Both of the winning titles feature people, places, and culture, fulfilling the newest goal of the ONEBOOKAZ program: to help Arizonans read their way to the upcoming Sate Centennial in 2012. ONEBOOKAZ kicks off on April 11, 2009 at the Tempe Center for the Arts with an awards program and literary evening with the authors. Other activities in April will include author talks, book signings, book discussions, and many more events planned in Flagstaff, Phoenix, Prescott, Tucson, and other cities. Both authors will also appear at the Tucson Festival of Books in March.
